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CLUB REPORT SHOWS WORK OF MEMBERS

Needlecraft Women Give Much to Red Cross in Past Six Months—Materials Are Donated.

(From Saturday's Daily.) Proof that even a small women's organization, if properly conducted, can do much good in aiding the war is the noticeable feature of the semi-annual report which the Needlecraft club, of Boulevard addition, completed this week. The club will be remembered as the one which a few days ago sent 111 Christmas boxes to Camp Lewis. Early in July the group of club women joined the "My America" league and became actively engaged in Red Cross work. Many of the materials used in the making of the articles which they later turned over to the local branch of the Red Cross were donated by the members although 10 pairs of bed socks and one dozen nightgales were made out of the cloth supplied by the Red Cross. Other articles manufactured by patient fingers were three dozen dust cloths, 10 dozen handkerchief substitutes, two dozen scrub cloths and three and one-half dozen napkins. Two rainbow counterpanes and five additional knitted squares were sent direct to Portland headquarters. These with candy for the 111 Christmas boxes, 13 comfort kits and 18 pairs of wristlets complete the work of the club for the six months. NO DRAFT PRIOR TO FEBRUARY 15

FUTURE QUOTAS TO BE FILLED FROM CLASS I—NEXT OFFICERS' TRAINING CAMP WILL BEGIN JANUARY 15 IN SOUTH.

(From Monday's Daily.) PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 31.—Except to fill vacancies in calls already made, no more men will be drafted from Oregon or other states before February 15. As all questionnaires will be completed before that date, this will give men taken hereafter, except such few as may be needed prior to February 15 to fill vacancies, the advantage of the new classification system. Very few men would have been taken from Oregon in any event prior to the next draft, which it is announced will be not earlier than February 15. This is one of only 10 states that have already filled their quotas in the first draft, barring a few vacancies caused by rejections at the training camps. Future draft quotas are to be filled from Class I, comprising men without dependents. They will be drafted from deferred classifications only when Class I is exhausted, thus making it necessary to go to the next class for enough men to fill up the quota. An exception to this will be made in the case of experts and men highly skilled in agriculture or industries. It is announced that the government will soon call for a large number of men of this special class. They will be taken as needed for such special work from whatever classification they may have been granted. A limited number of officers now in active service, and retired officers of the Oregon National Guard, who are physically fit and between the ages of 23 and 47, are eligible for enlistment as privates first class for attendance at the next officers' training camps, which begin January 15. Official word to this effect has just been received by John M. Williams, acting adjutant general, from the chief of the bureau of military affairs at Washington, with the request that it be given publicity. Applications for the camps by such officers must be approved by the bureau. Those qualifying at the camps, which will be held in Southern California and the southern states, will receive commissions. sheets, old table linen, sweaters which had passed their days of usefulness and small scraps of yarn left from other knitted garments.
