Ranchers From Upper Deschutes to Discuss Problems of Cattle Range With Forest Officials.

McDaniels, of Portland, will preside over the session, which will be similar to those held at Sisters and Fort Rock the past week. Questions regarding the cattle range will be taken up.

MAN FROM SISTERS SECURES DISCHARGE

Aubrey E. Perry Will Return From Camp Lewis—Exemption Because of Dependents.

(From Thursday's Daily.) Word has been received from Camp Lewis of the discharge of Aubrey E. Perry, of Sisters, because of the fact that he is married. He was water master of the Squaw Creek district and claimed exemption on agricultural grounds but made no claim because of having dependents. The agricultural claim was denied and he went to camp with the other drafted men from this section but will now be returned to his home.

With the report of Mr. Perry's discharge comes a request that another man be sent but, according to the local board, two more men than the county quota have already been sent and so no more will go. The next in turn is A. W. Spears, now in Portland.

CAN HAVE NO FUNDS FOR HIGHWAY WORK

Members of County Court Return From Conference With State Highway Commission.

(From Thursday's Daily.) Returning this morning from Portland where they had been in consultation with the State Highway Commission, the members of the Deschutes county court report that no funds will be available from the commission for highway construction this year or until the commission is able to sell its bonds. Deschutes county is not alone in this, no money being available for any part of the state.

New regulations of the Federal Reserve Bank concerning the sale of new bond issues, which make it impossible for the state to place its securities at the present time, are the reason for the situation. Whenever any money is available it is understood that Deschutes county will be one of the first to receive additional aid.

A. H. WINTERS DIES. (From Monday's Daily.) Word has reached here of the death of A. Howard Winters, aged 37, well known in Bend about two

years ago. Mr. Winters was living in Montesano, Washington, where he belonged to the volunteer fire department. On his way to a fire on February 6 the auto he was riding in crashed into a bank building and was wrecked. Its five occupants were injured, Mr. Winters later succumbing from the effects of a broken leg and internal injuries. He was the senior member of the firm of Winters Brothers and had a homestead near Crescent.

BENNETT-COOPER CO. PURCHASES GROCERY

Ben F. Roseman, Former Owner, Leaves City—Store to Be Operated on Cash Basis.

(From Wednesday's Daily.) Early this week the Bennett-Cooper Company completed the purchase of the Union Grocery, formerly owned by Ben F. Roseman, and is now operating the store. With the change of management, a strict policy of curtailing expenses is to be carried out, in the hope that by doing so customers may be benefited by lower prices. For this reason business will be on a strictly cash basis and other changes will be made, as advocated in the letter sent by the government to all the retail grocers.

The store will carry a complete stock and will be run practically independent of the Bennett-Cooper establishment in the Pringle block. Two clerks will have charge of the place.

Mr. Roseman came here late last summer and opened a grocery on Oregon street, later moving into the old Bend Theatre, which was remodeled for him. He intended staying here merely until he had recuperated his health, which had been broken down while he was engaged in the medical practice. He was a very prominent surgeon in the east and has gone back to Lewiston, Idaho, to re-enter this profession.

H. C. OLIVER HERE TO FILL VACANCY

Replaces S. L. Wiggins as O.-W. R. and N. Traveling Freight and Passenger Agent.

(From Thursday's Daily.) While temporarily filling the place of S. L. Wiggins, formerly traveling freight and passenger agent for the O.-W. R. & N. Company, H. C. Oliver, of Portland, is making his headquarters in Bend. Mr. Wiggins left last Saturday for Washington, D. C., to be connected with the traffic department of the war board.

Mr. Oliver will be assisted by W. H. Hicks, of Portland, who will arrive here some time next week. Both men have been working on the main line from Portland but will now go out from Bend and cover all of the Central Oregon territory until a new man can be found to take Mr. Wiggins' place. Mr. Oliver made his first trip in here 19 years ago, when he drove in to make a report on this territory. His last visit was paid a year ago. In checking up on the office reports the new man has found the business for the past year very much increased.

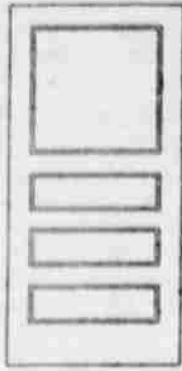
