the advisory board from the Lower Bridge section, Mr. Knickerbocker from the Three Creek section, and Mr. Edgington from Trout Creek and Squaw Creek sections. The financial condition of the association was pronounced in good condition, there being \$50 in the treasury. A meeting of the advisory board is to be held the first Saturday of each month to receive complaints. A special session has been called for March 9 for the purpose of discussing applications for grazing privileges on the forest reserve. March 18 has also been sent for another special meeting. Among other business taken up was the petition circulated by Mr. Tone, who tried to get enough signers to lease land on the slough, but failed.

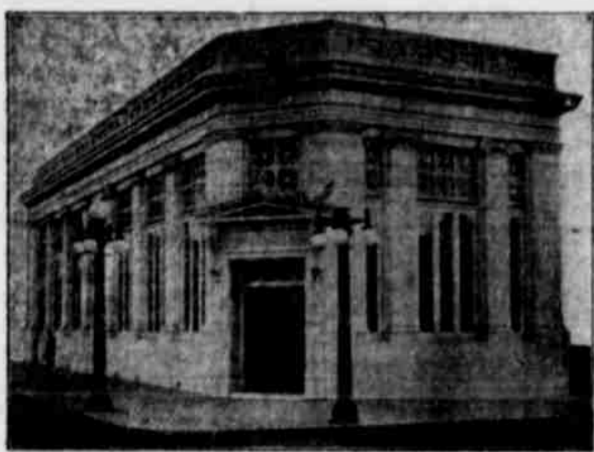
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
