Bread Menus

The following menus are the best of those that have come to our attention and really have merit. We recommend them as bread substitutes. Cut out this list for future reference.

YEAST BREAD

cup liquid yeast or 1 cake compressed yeast

tablespoons sugar

tablespoons shortening cups liquid (milk, scalded and cooled, or water or both)

1-2 qts. flour (approximately) Make into a sponge, using only a part of the flour, and allow to became thoroughly light; stir in remainder of flour and work until perfectly smooth. The amount of flour will vary somewhat with the kind used. Allow to rise until more than twice the original bulk. Shape into loaves with as little working as will permit smoothness. Allow to rise again and bake in oven at 400 degrees F right side up on wire rack. Keep in tin bread boxes. Do not wrap in cloth or paper. All bread should be baked in individual loaf pans for one hour. The above is known as "sponge method." The "dough method" differs only in that all the flour is added at first, thus making dough instead of a sponge. The "dough method" is thoroughly satisfactory. Makes 4 loaves.

WHEAT FLOUR SUBSTITUTES

Substitutes one-fourth or more of the amount of flour called for by using: Cornmeal Rolled Oats Potato Flour Buckwheat

QUICK BREADS

Barley

Biscuits

cup flour 1 1-2 teaspoon baking powder

Oat Flour

1 to 1 1-2 tablespoon fat

Rice Flour

1-4 to 1-3 cup liquid

Sift dry ingredients together. Work in fat and add milk gradually. Dough should be soft as can be handled without sticking. Roll and cut quickly. Bake in hot oven.

Modifications may be made in same proportions recommended for yeast bread.

GRAHAM FRUIT BREAD

1-2 teaspoon salt

1 1-2 cups graham flour 1 teaspoon salt 3-4 cups white flour 3-4 cup corn meal or barley flour

2 cups sour milk

1-2 cup molasses

1 cup raisins or nuts (or 1-2 the amount of each) 2 teaspoons soda Mix and sift dry ingredients together, reserving 1-4 cup white flour. Mix sour milk and molasses. Stir in dry ingredients, beating thoroughly. Dredge raisins in the white flour and add. Add nuts.

CORN BREAD WITH BARLEY FLOUR

cup corn meal cup barley flour 1 teaspoon salt t cup milk

tablespoons sugar teaspoons baking powder

1 egg 2 tablespoons fat

Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add milk, beaten egg and melted fat. Beat well. Place in an oiled pan and allow to stand in a warm place 20 to 25 minutes. Then bake in a moderate oven 40 to 45 minutes. BARLEY AND CORN MEAL MUFFINS

> 1 tablespoon sugar 3-4 cup milk

1-2 cup corn meal 1-2 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon fat 4 teaspoons baking powder Mix and sift dry ingredients, add milk and melted fat. Beat well. Bake in oiled muffin pans in a

hot oven 30 to 35 minutes. CORN MEAL FARINA PUDDING

1 1-2 cup barley flour

Cooked cereal (half farina and half corn meal) 1 1-2 cups Corn strup (light) 1-2 cup Nutmeg, 1-4 teaspoon. Cloves, 1-8 teaspoon Milk, 1-8 cup Raisins, seeded, 1-2 cup Cinnamon, 1-4 teaspoon

Heat cereal with milk and corn strup in double boiler until it has a smooth consistency. Add spices and raisins. Bake about 45 minutes in a moderate oven.

OATMEAL PUDDING Cooked oatmeal, 2 cups Salt, 1-2 teaspoon Corn sirup (dark), 1-3 cup Cloves, 1-8 teaspoon. Raisins, seeded and cut into halvese, 1-2 cup


