PUT IN NEW PLANT AT LOWER BRIDGE

Silica Mines Change Management—More Men Will Be Needed to Handle Equipment.

LOWER BRIDGE, Feb. 25.—Those from Lower Bridge attending the irrigation school at Redmond were A. S. Holmes, L. A. Hunt, C. F. Hoskins, Gus Stadig, R. S. Towne and Frank Chapman.

The silica mines at Lower Bridge have passed to new management. Extensive preparations are being made for both the mining and pulverizing of the silica. The plant for the pulverizing will be an expensive, and most of the work will be done by machinery. When the mines are running to capacity about 25 or 30 men will be employed. An advance order is in for 600 car loads for immediate delivery. The silica has many uses, the principal one being for the filtration of sugar.

The dance at the Community hall Friday evening was greatly enjoyed by those present, there being a number from Prineville and Bend.

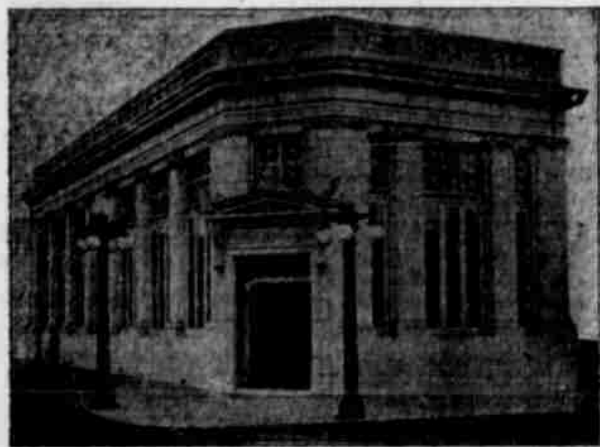
