As a result of the change it was found many DISH TOWELS WANTED; counties had been overpaid in the past, and consequently many counties underpaid. By a system of bookkeeping these counties will be gradually brought back to an even basis, and where they have been overpaid, they will receive their pro rata share this year, but not in cash, only in the shape of a credit against the amount which they have been overpaid, while the counties that were underpaid will be paid an excess in cash over what they would other-

wise have received. Share is \$954.00

Deschutes county will receive \$511.67 from its share of \$954 as receipts from the Deschutes forest reserve. The reserve has a total of 1,292,423 acres, of which 993,184 acres are in Deschutes county.

Crook county will be credited with \$481.95 out of a total of \$810.12 from the receipts of the Ochoco forest reserve. All told there are 716,564 acres in this reserve, of which 356,174 are in Crook county.

Jefferson county will be credited with receipts from the Deschutes, Siskiyou and Umpqua reserves. It will be credited with \$82.29 from the \$954 in rereipts from the Deschutes reserve, there being 111,483 acres of the total 1,292,423 acres of that reserve in that county. It will be aredited with \$24.03 of the total of \$4.741.67 of the receipts from the Oregon reserve, there being 5,229 acres of that reserve in that county. out of a total of 1,031,926 acres. It will receive a credit of only 69 cents from the Santiam reserve, there being only \$32 acres of that reserve in Jefferson county, out of a total of 607,099 acres.

Some to Boads

The money received from these forest reserve receipts, under the new law, are to be divided 75 per cent to the county road fund and 25 per cent to the county school fund.

It may be noted that Deschutes county, by its separation from Crook county, receives actual cash from the division, while Crook county still stands considerably in arrears. This situation is based on an opinion from Attorney General Brown to Secretary Olcott, in which he holds it is presumed these matters were settled when the county was divided.

CAR SITUATION IS GOOD IN BEND MILLS
