MORE ACTION TAKEN ON TUMALO CONTRACT

Liens Released, Certification of Proof and Deeds Issued by Desert Land Board

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 4.—(Special to the Bulletin.) The Desert Land Board has taken the following action relative to contracts on the Central Oregon and Tumalo Irrigation projects:

It appearing that Tumalo contracts No. 207 and 208 have been assigned by the original applicant, C. W. Richardson to Mr. J. B. Miner and by Mr. Miner to the Desert Land Board for the purpose of cancelling the same, it is hereby ORDERED that the said contract be cancelled and that the Chairman and Secretary be authorized to execute a cancellation of the same for record in the County Records of Deschutes county.

Release of lien in accordance with law and Board regulations was ordered issued to A. J. Harter under T. I. P. contract No. 114.

"Everything is well and I'm feeling excellent. I have lots of good clothes and a nice warm place to sleep in and plenty to eat. The weather is just lovely here in France. Tell Charlie to please send me some tobacco as it is very hard to get any here. If you send anything be sure to nail it up tight because so many parcels are put together so that they are easily smashed. Could tell you many things if I could see you but can't write much."

Mr. McRoberts has been in France since December. He enlisted last April while visiting in Woodburn and is now with the 162nd infantry.
