## COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Bend, Oregon, Feb. 23, 1918.

The county court met in the judge's office at 10 o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment, Judge Barnes and Commissioner C. H. Miller of Redmond, being present.

The meeting was called to order by the county judge, after which they adjourned for an inspection of the work on the Bend-Tumalo road.

The county court reconvened at 2 o'clock p. m., same members present as at morning session. A joint meeting was held with the city council of Bend to consider co-operation in cindering an east and west and a north and south thoroughfare through the city of Bend. The following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, it has been the practice of this court for good reasons to meet the cost of all road work by money from the general fund to which incorporated towns contribute their pro rata share.

Therefore, it is deemed equitable that main thoroughfares through such municipalities, consisting of an East and West and a North and South road, be improved at the expense of the county in like manner as county roads, and, in recognition of this fact, the County Court of Deschutes County makes the following stipulation:

Understanding that the City of Bend contemplates improving Greenwood avenue from the Newport avenue bridge to the Railroad viaduct, and an area bounded by Greenwood avenue and Franklin street on the north and south, and Bond and Wall on the east and west, by means of surfacing with volcanic cinders, the county hereby agrees to lay, or have laid by the city, the same being paid for from the general fund of the county, a strip of cinder paving 20 feet wide, and to the depth of 4 inches, spread loose, measuring a distance of approximately eight blocks (this being the shortest distance necessary to connect the main thoroughfares through this improved area), and connecting the Tumalo-La Pine, and the Sisters-Bend-Burns highways, by most direct route; this agreement being conditions upon the City of Bend constructing a road of similar character on Franklin, from the end of the La Pine Highway to its intersection with Bond, at the expense of the city of Bend.

No further business coming up for consideration at this time, on motion duly made and seconded, court adjourned to meet March 4, 1918.

The regular session of the County Court of Deschutes County, Oregon, met in the County Judge's office, March 6, 1918. The meeting was called to order by the County Judge at 10:00 o'clock a. m., Judge Barnes and Commissioner C. H. Miller being present.

Now at this time comes up for consideration the following resolution for the opening of certain roads

Ray E. Newcomb Road

Whereas, the County Court of Deschutes County, State of Oregon, on this 5th day of March, 1918, being a regular term of said Court, deeming it expedient and to the best interests of the public, and to those concerned, that a County Road be located, established and opened as a County Road, as hereinafter designated and established, therefore,

Be it resolved by the said County Court of Deschutes County, State of Oregon, that said Court hereby declares its intention to locate, establish and open as a County Road the

following described road to wit:

Beginning at a point on the C. W. Allen County road at the northwest corner of the northwest quarter of the southwest quarter, Section 9, Tp. 16 south, Range 12 east, thence north along sub division line one-half mile to intersect the section line between sections 4 and 9, Tp. 16 south, Range 12 east at the northwest corner of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter Section 9, Tp. 16 south, Range 12 east; thence west along the section line between sections 4 and 9 and 5 and 8, Tp. 16 south, Range 12 east to intersect the Tumalo-Cline Falls road at the north quarter corner of Section 8, Tp. 16 south, Range 12 east W. M. Said road to be 40 feet wide.

Be it further resolved that proper notice of the locating, establishing and opening of said road be given as provided by law.

Any remonstrances or objections thereto must be filed herein within five weeks from the date hereof.

Dated this 6th day of March, 1918.

B. F. Piery Road

Whereas, the County Court of Deschutes County, State of Oregon, on this 6th day of March, 1918, being a regular term of said Court, deeming it expedient and to the best interests

of the public, and to those concerned, that a County Road be located, established and opened at a County Road, as hereinafter designated and established, therefore,

Be it resolved by the said County Court of Deschutes County, State of Oregon, that said Court hereby declares its intention to locate, establish and open as a County Road the following described road to wit:

Beginning at the center of Section 17, Tp. 16 south, Range 12 east, thence east one-half mile, thence north one mile to intersect the C. W. Allen road at the east quarter corner of Section 8, Tp. 16 south, Range 12 east. Said road to be 40 feet wide.

Be it further resolved that proper notice of the locating, establishing and opening of said road be given as provided by law.

Any remonstrances or objections thereto must be filed herein within five weeks from the date hereof.
