

Council Adheres Closely To Estimate Of Expense

Because of the necessity of adhering closely to the budget the city expenditures for the past month showed a marked decrease over those of January. At the meeting of the city council this week \$874.35 was allowed, less than the sum set aside out of the \$12,390 budget. According to the monthly allotment \$943 could be spent, leaving a small margin for emergencies.

It was necessary to practise sharp economy in order to balance up with

the \$1460.56 paid out in January, principally for fire, lights and water, special police and street and sidewalk repairs.

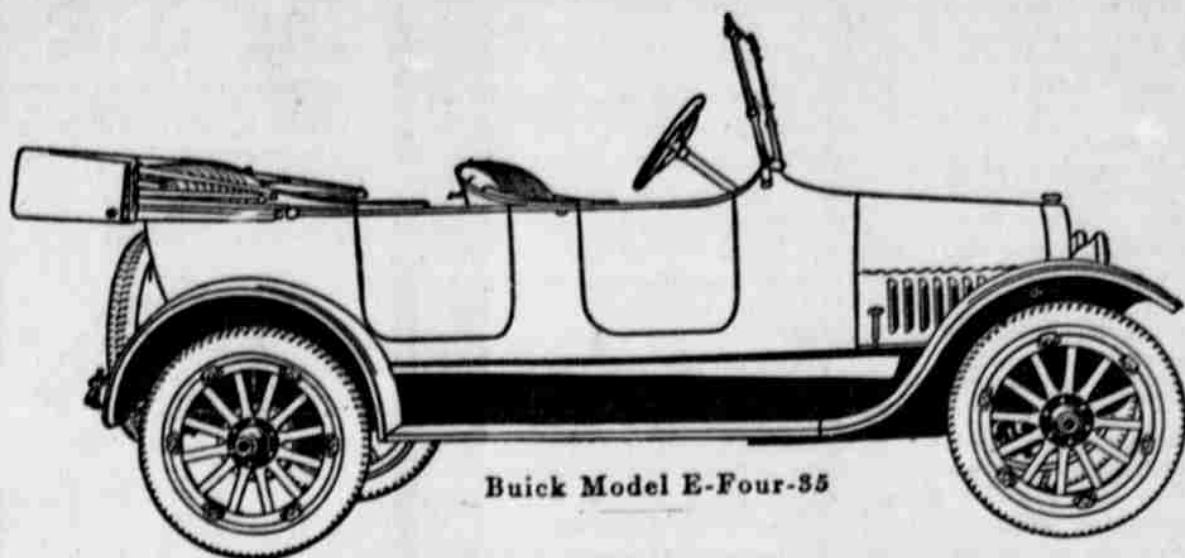

SHIP POTATOES TO CALIFORNIA

LARGE PART OF CENTRAL OREGON CROP GOES TO SAN FRANCISCO—BRING GOOD PRICES—SPUDS MUCH IN DEMAND

(From Friday's Daily.)
Large shipments of Central Oregon potatoes are now going to California and Texas as fast as cars can be secured for them. In spite of this move, a large number will go to waste on the farmers' hands.

The Deschutes Valley Potato Growers association has had a strong demand for seed tubers, which have brought good prices, according to County Agricultural Agent Ward. At a meeting of the directors held in his office last Saturday the situation was discussed. It was found that 20 cars of number one grade had been shipped and there is a standing order for eight more. About 17 more cars of the best potatoes are still in the county. Those sold have brought \$1.15 in San Francisco while 90 cents has been the prevailing price from the dealers.

A representative of the association was sent this week to The Dalles to see if the government order for 600 tons of dried potatoes to be prepared by the Wittenberg-King Company could be contracted for in this section.

The meeting Saturday was attended by Gus Stadig, J. F. Rice, R. U. Flickinger, W. C. Arnold, S. D. Mustard and Mr. Ward.
