

MCNARY IS OUT FOR LONG TERM

QUESTION OF SHORT PERIOD SENATOR LEFT TO LEGISLATIVE BODY—OREGON MAN DEFINES HIS POSITION.

WASHINGTON, March 25.—Senator McNary will be a candidate for the long term senatorship only, leaving to the senate to decide whether a short term senator shall be seated if a claimant appears with a certificate of election after next November.

In a statement defining his position Senator McNary said:

"In view of the opinion of Attorney General Brown that the electorate of Oregon has two senatorial terms to fill I shall be a candidate only for the long term commencing March, 1919. While the United States Senate has accepted my credentials as continuing until that time, yet should the Senate adopt the decision of the attorney general that the short term intervenes I shall gladly yield the office to the candidate selected by the voters to fill the short term, and in that event it will be my purpose to assist the occupant in every way possible to make his term resultful to the people of Oregon. If I am successful in my candidacy for the long term, I shall remain at Washington so that I may prosecute without interruption my work for the advancement of Oregon."
