will be employed at the various mills. Market for Stumpage.

Aside from its importance locally the new operation will prove of great value to settlers and others owning timber claims in the section south of Bend by providing a market for their stumpage considerably in advance of their present expectations. With such claims and other stumpage available in the vicinity of the mills they are expected to have timber sufficient for their operation for some years to come.

The company operating the mills will be known as the I X L Lumber company, Mr. Steidl being the president and Mr. Wilkinson the secretary and treasurer. While the organization is being completed H. C. Ellis occupies the position of vice president.

Both Men Prominent.

Both Mr. Steidl and Mr. Wilkinson have been residents of Bend for many years and have both had much to do with the timber development of this section. Mr. Steidl took an active part in timber location work in the early days of Bend and it was through him that the Shevlin interests made their first purchase of timber in this section. He was also connected with one of the first saw mills to operate here. Mr. Wilkinson built the Pine Tree mill and has since then operated small mills in different parts of Deschutes county.
