

# COUNTY THIRD IN STAMP SALE

**ONLY TWO COUNTIES OF THE STATE HAVE SURPASSED THIS FOR SALE OF W. S. S.—LIBERTY LOAN HURT.**

(From Friday's Daily.) Deschutes county is standing third in the sale of thrift stamps in the state, according to a report compiled by Jesse A. Curry, state distributor, and published in the "Sticker," the official organ of the Oregon war savings committee. Deschutes county's percentage is 218 per cent. of her quota, with Linn county next higher with 228 per cent. and Wheeler first with 30 per cent.

Stamp sales at the Bend office have aggregated \$18,308.90 since the commencement of the war savings plan, or an average of \$3,661.78 per month. Sales during the first 18 days of this month have been much lower than at any time during the two previous months, but this is explained by the rush of the Liberty loan drive the early part of last week. Postmaster Ford has stated that the sales have increased perceptibly during the past three or four days, and the month may yet be rounded out with a fair average.

**Warrant Ordered for Purchase of Uniforms for Home Defense Guards:**

This matter coming up before the court for consideration, it was ordered that a warrant for one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) be appropriated to purchase uniforms for Home Defense Guards, upon presentation to the court that the state has furnished the requisite arms.

Assessor W. T. Mullerkey appeared before the court at this time to consult as to valuations for purposes of assessment for the year 1918.

**Report on Status of Work of Transcribing Records from Those of Crook Co., and Statement of Assets and Liabilities for Year 1917:**

Max Crandall, accountant, presented the following report on status of work of transcribing records from those of Crook Co., and a statement of assets and liabilities for year 1917. To Honorable County Court, Deschutes County, Ore. Gentlemen:

On the investigation of the work pertaining to the transcribing of records of Crook county, for the records of Deschutes county, which you have asked me to do, will say I went to Prineville and found the following conditions:

The transcribing consists of nineteen volumes of deeds, two volumes of U. S. patents, one volume of miscellaneous instruments and fourteen volumes of mortgages.

The deeds and U. S. patent records have now been proof read and fourteen volumes have been bound. The balance are waiting for covers, that have been ordered for some time. The deed records are now in clerk's office in Bend.

There has been transcribed 160 cases in equity in a circuit court journal, as follows: Complaint, demurrers or other appearances and disposition of the case. A register of all papers filed in each case is entered at the heading of each case.

There are 112 completed cases in probate court and a total of 217 cases.

There are from four to six weeks, one person transcribing, to be done on court cases.

There is uncompleted the proof-reading of the fourteen volumes of mortgages and without any comparison to guide them, the people doing this work estimate it will take until May 10th or 20th to complete.

There are 106 plats of city additions pertaining to property in Deschutes county that is yet to be transcribed.

The original tracing of these plats were removed from the files of Crook county and brought to this county, but as some of these are for bound records, part and perhaps all will have to be returned to them.

The cost of doing these plats in a workmanly manner, with the care necessary to make a correct record, has been estimated by surveyors to be about \$1,000.00. This amount is disputed, but it is a class of work that is very exacting and should not be slighted.

There are approximately 120,000 folio on deeds, mortgage and miscellaneous records transcribed. The cost to date has been \$3,413.72, and, if finished by May 15th, will cost in addition \$380. This is for work only, transcribing, proofreading and janitor. Mr. Haner has made no charge for certification, nor extra personal expenses as yet.

The tax records have been transcribed in part only. The delinquent taxes, yet unpaid, for years 1910, 1911, 1912, 1913 and 1914 will not take very much time to transcribe, but if a complete record is intended in reading of laws of 1913, page 25, section 12, of chapter 10, "and tax records relating to, or affecting real estate new county," is intended to have a complete tax record, it will be a much larger task.

There is a class of records that is not demanded by law to be transcribed, which if not may cause loss to some taxpayer by unscrupulous persons, and that is chattel mortgages. The chattel mortgages on personal property in this county have not been transcribed.

There is a carbon copy of all the 36 transcribed volumes belonging to the county which are worth from \$20.00 to \$30.00 each to anyone wishing to start an abstract business and which will materially reduce the cost of the transcribing.

Nor do we know the amount collected by Crook county since division date on taxes prior to 1915. The furniture for furnishing court offices and court room cost \$3,344.50.
