

ENLISTED MEN FOR THE FARMS

WILL BE GRANTED FURLOUGHS TO PERMIT THEM TO RETURN TO WORK DURING THE HARVEST SEASON.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

That enlisted men are to be granted furloughs to return to their homes and work during the harvest season was the advice received by County Agricultural Agent Ward from the war department yesterday. The length of time of the furlough and the ability of the applicants to leave for such a furlough depends, according to the announcement, on the status of his military training, and whether such furlough will interfere with his efficiency as a soldier.

Applications for such furloughs must come from the farmers and crop owners and not from the soldier himself. This application must be made to the local board, and is divided into six classes, or divisions. Division 1 provides for the signature of the person making application for the soldier and for whom his services are desired.

Division 2 provides for a complete statement of facts from the applicant for the soldier for whom the application is made. In this section a complete survey of the applicant's farming operations must be made.

Division 4 provides for the recommendation and finding of the local board.

Division 4. The county agricultural agent concurs in or dissents from the recommendation and findings of the board.

Division 5. In this section the soldier is required to take the oath regarding his ability to do farm work, and requires his promise to comply.

Division 6 constitutes the approval of the commanding officer for the application.

The application is granted the soldier for a furlough, providing the applicant agrees to pay the average wages paid in the vicinity. Soldiers must signify their wishes to engage in farm work, and on no instance will a soldier be compelled to engage in farm work unless he so desires.

Speaking of the matter, County Agent Ward said: "There are a number of farm boys from Deschutes and Crook counties now in military training. Parents of these boys who desire to have them home during the harvesting season are requested to get in touch with the local board and the county agricultural agent, where they can gain further information. Application blanks will be furnished either by the local board or the county agent's office."

FUEL ORDERS TO BE REGISTERED

FEDERAL AGENT IN THE STATE ASKS THAT DEALERS KEEP TRACK OF ALL FUEL SOLD IN THE STATE.

Fuel purchasers in Bend, and for that matter the entire state, will in a short time have to make declaration of the amount of fuel used during the past year, according to an order from Fred J. Holmes, federal fuel administrator for Oregon. Although no limitation on the amount of fuel that may be stored has been fixed, arrangements have been completed for registering every fuel purchase in the state.

Within a few days every purchaser of wood or coal will be compelled to file a declaration as to the amount of fuel used last year, the quantity remaining on hand and the quantity desired. The statement must be certified to and any wilfully false declaration opens the way for government prosecution.

Purchasers will file their fuel orders with their dealers as usual and the dealers in turn will forward the data to the fuel administrator's office along with their report. Dealers will have the application blanks on hand in the near future. Under the new arrangements the dealer's report will show for what purpose the fuel is being purchased. By this method Mr. Holmes will be able to keep in close touch with the needs of the state and the information will be of the utmost value in arranging for wood and coal distribution.

LOAFERS NOT WANTED BY POOL HALL MEN

Say They Are a Detriment to Business and Would Be Glad to Get Rid of Them.

That loafers around pool and billiard halls do not help the business of these resorts, and that the proprietors would be glad if they were taken out and put to work, is the opinion of D. T. Carmody, manager of Carmody Brothers. Speaking of the matter of taking the loafers out and putting them to work, as proposed at the weekly meeting of the Commercial club last Tuesday, Mr. Carmody stated there were very few loafers around the resorts in Bend, and they were a detriment rather than an aid to the business. Mr. Carmody does not believe it is necessary to close the places of business to get rid of this element, but says it can be done in other ways.
