

WOODSMEN ARE SUNDAY VICTORS

MILL TEAM UNABLE TO DOWN LOGGERS.

Take Every Event with Exception of Broad Jump and Get Away with Tie in That Instance—Over \$200 Raised.

(From Monday's Daily.) Taking every event but one, the loggers' team of the Loyal Legion, Brooks-Seanlon company, defeated the mill team of the same company in the first field and track event held between them on Sunday at the company camp.

The event, which was scheduled as a benefit for the Red Cross, commenced in the morning, when two carloads of people left Bend for the camp on the logging train. Arriving at the camp, immediately after luncheon had been served by the ladies the flag raising took place, six girls, employes of the box factory—Misses Eleanor Ward, Bessie Vaughn, Marie St. Claire, Miss Redmond and Beulah Landfare raising the flag into place. During the flag raising the "Star Spangled Banner" and other patriotic airs were sung, the singing being led by Fred Lucas, Mrs. Chapman, Genevieve Wagner, Genevieve Gerrity and Marie Fox.

After the flag raising, Mr. Keyes stated the purpose for which the event was being held, and the sports were taken up, the names of the contestants and winners being given in. Bessie Vaughn, first; Mrs. Joe Markee, second.

Tug-of-War, with ten men on each

side—Won by logging team. Broad Jump—Logging team: Jesse Short, Melvin Crow, A Hill, Roy Seligood. Mill team: Starr, Vaughn, M. W. Wagner. Short and Wagner tied for first; Roy Seligood of the loggers took second.

Following the broad jump, the ball game, one of the fastest which has been played in the county, took place on an improvised diamond which had been prepared by the woodsmen during the previous week. This event alone netted the Red Cross \$62.50 by popular subscription. The lineup was as follows:

In addition new teachers have been elected as follows: Miss Margaret Hansen, Corvallis; Miss Beatrice Chaney, The Dalles; manual training teacher, T. D. Sexton, The Dalles.

TRANSCRIPTION EXPENSES LOW

JEFFERSON COST MORE THAN DOUBLE.

Records, Now Nearly Complete, Will Cost the County Less Than \$4,000—Draft Expense Sets Low Rate.

(From Monday's Daily.) Transcription of the records of Deschutes county from the records of Crook county, which is practically completed with the exception of comparing seven books of mortgage records, has cost the county \$2,922 to date, or about 50 per cent. of the expense of a similar work for Jefferson county, where the number of records transcribed was only about 50 per cent. as large, according to County Clerk J. H. Haner, who has had charge of the work, and to whom all of the credit is due for the great saving of money to this county.

The work which has been completed for this county up to the present time is as follows:

- Twenty-two books of deeds and mortgages.
- Twelve books of mortgage records.
- One book of miscellaneous records.
- One book of circuit court cases.
- One book of judgment roll transcripts.
- One hundred and twenty-two cases of probate records.
- Four hundred and eight pages of road records.
- Eighty-eight drawings of road maps.
- Two hundred and twenty pages of water records.
- Two hundred and fifty-five water certificates.

The total number of folios, figuring at six points per word, equal 144,130, or, if actually counted by words, will equal 16 per cent. more than that number.

The amount set forth above is for the work only of transcribing, proof-reading and janitor work. To this must yet be added Mr. Haner's personal account of expenses and certification, and the additional cost of transcription of the mortgage records. Up to the present the volumes transcribed for the county have been taken in duplicate. As these duplicate volumes are worth from \$20 to \$30 each for anyone desiring to engage in the abstract business it is hoped the revenue from them will materially reduce the cost of the work.

Jefferson County Cost.
 The total number of folios transcribed by Jefferson county was 74,380, against 144,130 for this county. For this work Jefferson county paid the contractors \$6,970, exclusive of comparing and indexing. This is \$4,048 more than has been expended by this county up to the present time. Fifty per cent. of Jefferson's cost would equal \$3,485, or \$563 more than has already been expended by Mr. Haner in his work, and it is thought that the work can be completed by this county for that amount. No road or water records were transcribed by the Jefferson county contractor and only 23 cases of probate records, 12 books of deeds and seven books of mortgages.

Draft Call Expense Light.
 Another place where Mr. Haner made a record for himself was in the expense of handling the draft for this county. The cost to the county for the selective draft on the first call was \$52.50, covering all of the expenses under that call. The average expense per man, in Oregon, according to the bulletin of the provost marshal general, was \$4.83 which was third lowest in the United States, while the average in some states was \$19.57 per man. The cost in Deschutes county, however, was only \$20.8 cents per man, a record which probably stands as the lowest in the entire nation.

Large Number Records Filed.
 The business of the county clerk's office during the year 1917 was large in comparison to both Crook and Jefferson counties. More than double the number of instruments were filed with the county clerk here than with the Crook county office, and the Deschutes county filings was more than the total volume of such business handled by Jefferson county in its three years of business. Yet in spite of this amount of business the expenses of the office have been exceptionally low, being but \$5,892, which included the special expense and labor connected with the transcript of the Crook county records, and the duties imposed under the selective service law. The receipts for the office during the same period were \$5,509.53.
