Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Dawson and baby drove to Tumalo Thursday.

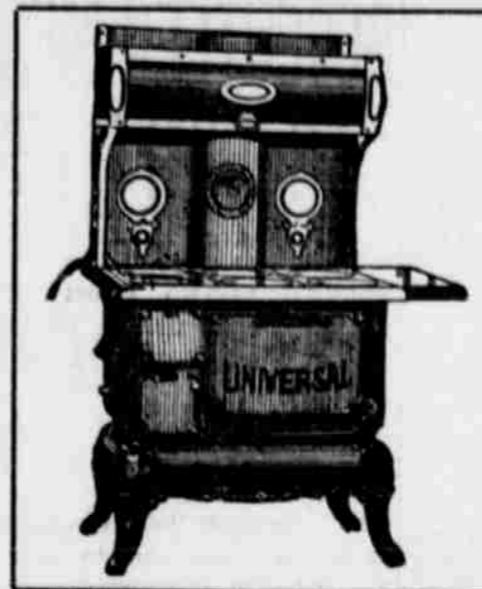
Wm. Clark passed through here Wednesday on his way to Bend.
