## LIBERTY LOAN AMOUNTS IN

OVER TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS SUBSCRIBED IN THE COUNTY AGAINST QUOTA OF \$117,000.

Deschutes county's total to the third Liberty loan reached the grand total of \$233,659, or \$116,659 over the \$117,000 quota set by the Portland headquarters, as the amount to be raised in this county. More than 1,600 subscribers took bonds, the exact number not being known, as no total is available from Redmond.

Subscribers in the county exclusive of the north end numbered 1,545, divided between 1,499 received at the two banks in this city and forty-six from La Pine.

Of this number 776 subscribed for \$128,100 to the First National and 723 subscribed for \$64,400 to the Central Oregon.

In the Redmond district \$37,750 was subscribed against a quota of \$22,000. This district included the towns of Redmond, Sisters, Cloverdale, Gist, Cline Falls, Lower Bridge, Terrebonne, Tetherow Butte, White Rock, Alfalfa and Powell Butte.

At La Pine seven subscribers are listed paid in full with a total of \$700, and 39 installment subscribers with a total of \$2,950. In addition to this \$650 was sent in by the Central state committee from people in Odell precinct, Klamath county. These are not listed in the La Pine district, but being only two and one-half miles distant have been placed to their credit.

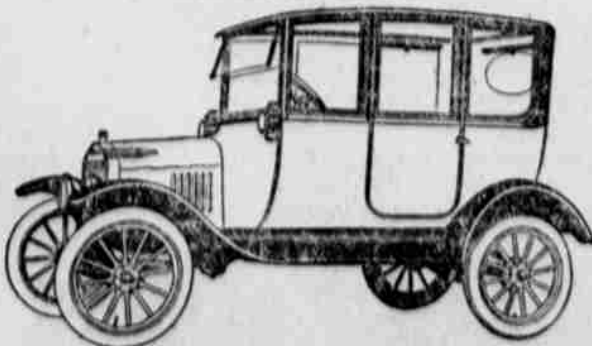
