

# FORTY-ONE MEN ADDED TO LIST

**COUNTY LIST OF REGISTRANTS  
OF AGE OF 21 YEARS FALLS  
SLIGHTLY SHORT OF ESTI-  
MATE OF OFFICIALS.**

(From Thursday's Daily.)  
Forty-one men who have become 21 years old since the last registration of a year ago registered with the local war board at the circuit court rooms yesterday afternoon. This is but very few less than was estimated by the officials, who had set fifty as the possible number of registrants. There was little activity in the work in the forenoon, but eleven having registered up until 12 o'clock. At 3 o'clock in the afternoon this number had been increased by seven more, making a total of 18, but it was not until after 6 o'clock in the evening that the real work of the board commenced, when the men started coming in from the mills.

Those registering during the day were mostly out of town registrants who had made the journey to this city for the express purpose of complying to the wishes of Uncle Sam, but during the later hours the men from Bend added their names to the roll.

Of the 41 registered there were 36 native born Americans, four aliens, not enemies, and one alien enemy. A complete list of the names will be available Saturday.

**GIRLS WILL TAKE UP MATTER  
OF ENLISTING BOYS OF THIS  
CITY IN BOYS' WORKING RE-  
SERVE.**

Within the coming week a corps of girls will be put to work in Bend registering members of the Boys' Working Reserve, according to J. Alton Thompson, representative of the government for Deschutes county in the Boys' Working Reserve enrollment. This work should have been completed several weeks ago, but the registrants appointed by Mr. Thompson have failed to make report and carry the work through.

Up to the present time there have been but three districts in the county making a report. Sisters was the first to be heard from and sent in her registration of five several weeks ago, later adding one more. Redmond is also in with eight members and Terrebonne with six.

These three towns represent but a small percentage of the boys in the county eligible to come under the government's registration for boys who are willing to work in useful employment during the school vacation and aid in relieving the shortage of labor.

Since the close of school in this city many of the boys have gone to work in the mills and box factories and it is planned by Mr. Thompson to have their employers register them wherever they will consent to do so, and in connection with this several young ladies will make a house-to-house canvass. It is believed that in this way the names of all of the boys in the city can be secured.

## COUNTY MUST RAISE \$83,000 IN W. S. DRIVE

**Citizens Will Be Asked to Meet in  
District School Houses and  
Give Pledges.**

Twenty thousand war savings certificates of a maturity value of \$100,000 must be sold in Deschutes county in the remaining seven months of 1918 if it is to meet the call made upon it by the United States treasury department. The actual cash outlay will be upward of \$83,000, the individual stamps of a maturity value of \$5 costing \$4.17 this month and one cent more per month as the months pass.

To insure the sale of the required number of stamps the people of the county will be asked to meet in the district school houses on June 28 at 8 o'clock and give in their pledges to buy stamps regularly during the remainder of the year. Each district will be given a minimum quota, as in the last Liberty bond campaign and a manager in each district will be expected to obtain pledges which will meet the district's allotment.

As a preliminary to the campaign a card index will be made up of every individual in the county over 16 years of age and an estimate made of the amount of stamps he should pledge himself to take.

Meeting early in the week to arrange plans for the coming drive, the local war savings executive committee took upon itself the responsibility of forming a county war committee to centralize and co-ordinate all local war effort, a committee being named as follows: J. P. Keyes, T. A. McCann, T. H. Foley, C. S. Hudson, H. J. Overturf, R. W. Sawyer and Ray Canterbury of Bend, J. F. Clough of La Pine, P. B. Johnson of Millican, J. F. Hosh, M. H. Lynch and R. A. Ward of Redmond, Gus Stadig of Lower Bridge, Fred N. Wallace of Tumalo and Ben Tone of Sisters. T. H. Foley, C. S. Hudson, R. A. Ward, R. W. Sawyer and Fred N. Wallace were named as an executive committee. A secretary will be employed.
