# FORTY-ONE MEN **ADDED TO LIST**

COUNTY LIST OF REGISTRANTS OF AGE OF 21 YEARS FALLS SLIGHTLY SHORT OF ESTI-MATE OF OFFICIALS.

(From Thursday's Dally.) Forty-one men who have become 21 years old since the last registration of a year ago registered with the local war board at the circuit court rooms yesterday afternoon. This is but very few less than was estimated by the officials, who had set fifty as the possible number of registrants, There was little activity in the work in the forenoon, but eleven having registered up until 12 o'clock. At 3 o'clock in the afternoon this number had been increased by seven more, making a total of 18, but it was not until after 6 o'clock in the evening that the real work of the board commenced, when the men started coming in from the mills.

Those registering during the day were mostly out of town registrants who had made the journey to this city for the express purpose of complying to the wishes of Uncle Sam, but during the later hours the men over from Saturday's session to spend from Bend added their names to the roll.
