Watt Jones and daughter, Mrs. Lena McPherson, were in Bend shopping on Thursday.

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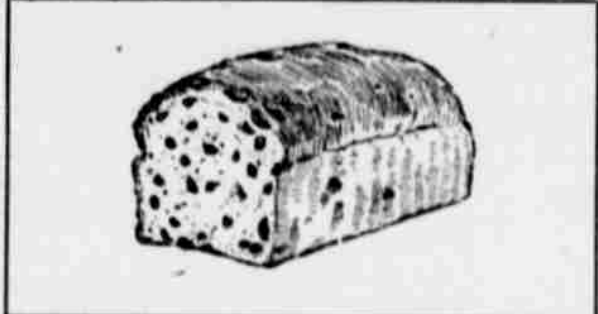
