

# NEW SULPHUR CLUB IS FORMED

FARMERS OF THE COUNTY HAVE ALREADY PLEDGED AN ADDITIONAL 80,000 POUNDS OF THE PRODUCT FOR FERTILIZER.

(From Monday's Daily.) Orders in sight for the next shipment of sulphur into Deschutes county aggregate in the neighborhood of 80,000 pounds, and when shipped will bring the grand total of sulphur received in the county up to 260,000 pounds.

Already the farmers of the Deschutes valley have had nearly 200,000 pounds of sulphur shipped in to be used for the fertilization of the alfalfa lands. It was presumed that the last shipment, amounting to 186,000 pounds, ordered by members of the Sulphur club, would give the product to all those who desired it in the two counties of Crook and Deschutes, but since its arrival other farmers of the valley have taken up the matter with County Agent Ward and are seeking another shipment, with the amount already pledged at 80,000 pounds.

Mr. Ward has taken the matter up with the government officials and has secured permission for the shipment. A time limit of 10 days has been given in which orders will be received by the county agent, after which the shipment will close. It is expected that over 100,000 pounds will be sent in this shipment.

## TYPHOID FEVER IS CAUSE OF DEATH

Miss Clara Rogers, Stricken One Week Ago, Dies at Home of Her Parents Here Saturday.

(From Monday's Daily.) Miss Clara Rogers, the 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Rogers, died at the home of her parents in this city last Saturday night after a short illness of typhoid fever.

Miss Rogers had lived in Bend for the past two years and was a sophomore in the high school. Funeral services will be held from the Methodist church at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

## EXAMINATIONS FOR FOREST RANGERS

The examinations are for rangers for the Deschutes national forest, and already several applications have been received by the office here.

Officials of the forest service are of the opinion that the number of applicants this year will not be as great as in former years, because of the men who have been called into the army and the higher salary paid other lines of government work.
