PROCLAMATION.

By order of the Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service, communicated to me through Dr. Robert E. L. Holt of the Oregon State Board of Health, and in consequence of the presence of Spanish influenza in Bend:
 I, Clyde M. McKay, as President of the Council and Mayor pro tem., by virtue of authority in me vested in the absence of Mayor Caldwell from the City of Bend, hereby direct the closing of all schools, churches, movies, libraries, lodges and societies; also all places of public amusement, including billiard and pool halls, bowling alleys, card rooms, whether public or in club rooms.
 The necessity is urged upon everyone to avoid crowds, public assemblies and shopping until the present epidemic has subsided. The hearty co-operation of everyone in this war measure will facilitate the lifting of this proclamation at an early date. This order becomes effective at 7 o'clock A. M., October 17th, 1918.
