

FRENCH GIRL SENDS ADDRESS

INTERESTING POST CARD RECEIVED BY MRS. L. E. BREEDEN IN ANSWER TO BULLETIN TOBACCO KIT.

(From Thursday's Daily.) One of the most interesting post cards to be returned from France by a soldier who has received a Bulletin tobacco kit has been received by Mrs. L. E. Breeden, who was one of the contributors to The Bulletin tobacco fund last winter.

The card is from De Vere Benton and is dated October 3. In addition to the soldier's message the card bears the signature and address of a 13-year-old French girl who has lost both parents in the war. "She would like a letter from America," it reads. The address given is Made-moiselle T. Scherun, 10 Place de l'Hotel de Ville, La Ferté-sous-Journe, Department Seine et Marne, France.

This town is on the River Marne and only a short distance southwest of Chateau Thierry. The message from Private Benton is as follows: "Thanks from a soldier and also from a young French girl who has a father and mother dead in the war. She is very nice and 13 years old. She would like a letter from America. Again, thank you. De Vere Benton."

KLAMATH PIONEER PASSES IN SOUTH

Mrs. Mary Sullivan, with Brother and Son in This City, Dies After Illness with Heart Trouble.

The report of the death of Mrs. Mary Sullivan of Klamath Falls at Long Beach, California, is contained in an article printed in the Klamath Falls Herald under date of Friday, October 25. Mrs. Sullivan was the sister of Gordon Myer of this city and the mother of Mike Sullivan, also a Bend resident. The article follows:

"Word has just been received of the death of Mrs. Mary Sullivan at Long Beach, California. Mrs. Sullivan was a pioneer of Klamath Falls and will be remembered by many as one of the energetic upbuilders of the vicinity. Several months ago she was ordered to a lower altitude because of heart trouble, but the change brought no relief and she deceased passed away last Tuesday. The remains will arrive on the evening train and funeral services are to be held Tuesday."

MISUNDERSTANDING CLEARED UP

A misunderstanding relative to the canteen work of the Y. M. C. A. has been cleared up by the War Department, which issued the following:

"Matter of prices asked by Young Men's Christian Association for its articles sold in canteens overseas already investigated by war department and condition is being remedied. The Young Men's Christian Association was originally asked by General Pershing to run the canteens for the army on a cost basis. In order to do this it had to reckon in price fixing such overhead charges as transportation charges and marine insurance so that prices were much higher than in this country.

"The Young Men's Christian Association made no profits, but lost thousands of dollars. Arrangements now made will enable them to obtain supplies from sources that will reduce overhead charges and keep prices down."

Huts for nurses are maintained by the Y. W. C. A. at the base hospitals in France. To extend this work a portion of the United War Work funds to be raised in November will be used.

PERSHING'S "DO WITHOUT IT" CLUBS

Organization of "do without it" clubs in America, as a means of aiding the United War Work campaign, which opened November 11, was recommended by James F. Pershing, brother of General Pershing, in an address delivered recently in Portland in behalf of the drive. He urged the American people to make some sacrifices in order to help "carry on" the great undertaking that is to furnish money for war work in the battle zone during the coming year. A great percentage of American people, he said, do not know, from any sacrifices made thus far, that a war is in progress. Relaxation of activities because of peace proposals, he declared, should not be tolerated, and asked people of the country to throw their whole energy and co-operation behind this latest drive for securing funds for the seven big war-working agencies consolidated in the campaign.

SPANISH INFLUENZA PREVENTIVES

So high has become the death toll of Spanish influenza in the army and navy and citizenry of this country that the surgeon general of the army has issued rules to observe in avoiding the disease. President Wilson has urged that the directions be distributed widely throughout the country. The President will later order the directions placarded and posted in all government departments and army and navy posts. The directions follow:

HOW TO STRENGTHEN OUR PERSONAL DEFENSE AGAINST SPANISH INFLUENZA.

- 1. Avoid needless crowding—influenza is a crowd disease.
2. Smother your coughs and sneezes—others do not want the germs which you would throw away.
3. Your nose, not your mouth, was made to breathe through—get the habit.
4. Remember the three "C's"—a clean mouth, clean skin and clean clothes.
5. Try to keep cool when you walk and warm when you ride and sleep.
6. Open the windows always at home at night; at the office when practicable.
7. Food will win the war if you give it a chance—help by choosing and chewing your food well.
8. Your fate may be in your own hands—wash your hands before eating.
9. Don't let the waste product of digestion accumulate—drink a glass or two of water on getting up.
10. Don't use a napkin, towel, spoon, fork, glass or cup which has been used by another person and not washed.
11. Avoid tight clothes, tight shoes, tight gloves—seek to make nature your ally, not your prisoner.
12. When the air is pure, breathe all of it you can—breathe deeply.

CHANGES MADE IN THE BEND MILITIA

(From Monday's Daily.) Several important changes in the two companies of Bend militia were announced late Saturday as a result of the meeting of the officers of the militia held in Portland the latter part of last week.

Frank Kelleher, captain of Company B, has been promoted to major in place of Major Jay Salzman, who has been made lieutenant colonel of the Eastern Oregon regiment.

Latest reports from Col. Salzman are that he will probably remain in Portland.

NATIONAL FOREST OFFICIALS ARE HERE

(From Friday's Daily.) E. A. Sherman, assistant forester in charge of land, of Washington, D. C., and A. H. Wright, national forest examiner with headquarters at Portland, arrived in Bend yesterday morning and will spend several days in this vicinity in an examination of the Deschutes national forest. In company with H. E. Vincent, assistant forest supervisor, the party left yesterday afternoon for a trip to Davis lake, where they will make an investigation of the government experiment station at that place. They expect to return to Bend tonight.
