Hazel and Loyal Rhodes and Ruth Bradley made a business trip to John Perry's last Wednesday.

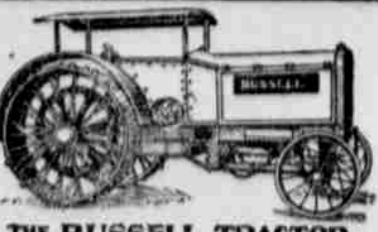
Beth Stauffer, who was absent all last week, has returned to school again.
