RIDER FAINTS, HORSE BOLTS

WEALTHY RANCHER FROM BEAR CREEK BUTTE, DRAGGED OVER ROCKS AND THROUGH BRUSH, BUT MAY RECOVER.

(From Tuesday's Daily.) Suffering from eight broken ribs, bruises all over his body, slight internal injuries, his leg crushed to a pulp, H. G. Mantey, Bear Creek Butte rancher, is lying at the Bend Surgical hospital, where it is believed he has an excellent chance for recovery. Mr. Mantey is 65 years old. While going for his mail, on horseback, the rancher fainted and fell from his mount, he stated after he regained consciousness. He was dragged through sagebrush and over rocks by the frightened animal until he was finally torn loose from the stirrup. About an hour later he was found by cowboys and taken to the Clarence Harvey ranch. Medical aid was summoned from Bend. The victim of the accident has lived a hermit existence for years on his ranch the other side of Bear Creek Butte. He is reputed to be wealthy.

GUARDSMEN IN ARMY WILL BE RELEASED

Will No Longer Be Members of Militia When Discharged From U. S. Service. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 24.—National Guardsmen who were taken into the army service by presidential proclamation July 3, 1917, will revert to civilian status when dismissed from the army. It was announced that if the National Guard continues as an organization, it will be necessary to form new units in all the states.

SLAV RADICALS MAKE REFORMS

LONDON LIBERAL PAPER DE-CLARES BOLSHEVIKI ARE EFFECTING REAL RESTORATION OF ORDER IN RUSSIA.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.) LONDON, Dec. 24.—Capping the growing wave of suspicion evidenced in the liberal press during the past month, the New Statesman makes the sensational announcement that the Bolsheviki, supported now by many of their former opponents, are effecting a real restoration of order in Russia. The New Statesman is regarded as being the sober element among Liberal intellectuals, and is not the organ of the extreme radicals. The article has undoubtedly heightened the impression that the full truth has not yet come to regarding the Russian situation.

GERMAN MARINES DEFY AUTHORITY

BERLIN, Dec. 24.—Mutinous marines, who revolted when ordered to go to sea, are entrenched in the royal palace after a battle with the military guards. On receiving orders, several regiments rioted, kidnapping the military commander of the city and holding him prisoner. In the fighting that ensued, four marines were killed and 19 wounded.

Under such regulations conflicts of equal rights will be determined by a drawing. Warning is expressly given in said proclamation that no settlement initiated prior to seven days after the date for homestead entry above named will be recognized, but all persons who go upon any of the land to be restored as therein provided and perform any act of settlement thereon prior to nine o'clock a. m., Standard time, January 22, 1919, or who are on or are occupying any part of said lands at such hour, except those having valid settlement rights initiated prior to withdrawal from settlement and since maintained, and those having preferences to make entry under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved June 11, 1906 (34 Stat., 233), and Acts amendatory, will be considered and dealt with as trespassers and will gain no rights whatever under such unlawful settlement or occupancy; provided, however, that nothing therein contained shall prevent persons from going upon and over the lands to examine them with a view to making entry thereof, or settlement thereon when the lands shall become subject thereto in accordance with said proclamation. Persons having prior settlement rights or preferences, as above defined, will be allowed to make entry in accordance with existing law and regulations. Intending entrymen are also warned to ascertain the status of the lands before making application therefor by inquiry of the local land offices before January 15, 1919, as a portion of the above described lands is not subject to entry, being embraced in entries under the public land laws.
