

# FEDERAL AID FOR IRRIGATION IN CENTRAL OREGON IS ASKED

(From Saturday's Daily.)

PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—Federal aid for the Deschutes irrigation project is asked in a resolution introduced here yesterday by C. B. McConnell at the State Irrigation congress. A further recommendation is made that the congress endeavor to induce the Oregon legislature to carry the Tumalo project to completion. In another resolution approval is expressed of the Sinnott bill which provides for the appropriation of \$1,000,000,000 for the reclamation of arid lands, swamps and logged-off lands for settlement by soldiers.

A resolution of approval of the proposed measure to change the name of the Panama canal to the Roosevelt canal was passed by the congress and the secretary was instructed to communicate to Mrs. Roosevelt the sympathy of the organization. A tribute to the memory of the ex-president was paid by President Upton, who said that without Theodore Roosevelt and his securing of the enactment of the reclamation act "there would not be an irrigation ditch in Oregon." The speaker went on to point out that every irrigator in the state should get behind Congressman N. J. Sinnott and insist that his bill for reclamation of arid, logged-off and swamp lands be given preference to the one proposed by Secretary Lane, in which he stated he could see designs to favor development of lands in the east and south, rather than those of the west.

President Upton submitted his annual report prior to his digression and giving of his opinion on the two bills. His remarks on this line called forth replies from numerous speakers. Professor Scudder, just back from Washington, said he had been told by Representative Sinnott that

the Lane bill will meet approval in congress and that there is no conflict in the two measures. William A. Stewart of Yakima stated that he is of the opinion that no sectional favoritism will be shown in the bills. Denton G. Burdick, chairman of the resolutions committee, took charge of the meeting during the presentation of resolutions.

A furor was created when C. B. McConnell of Burns presented a resolution calling on state officials to institute suits to reclaim to the state all school lands, swamp lands or any public lands acquired by fraud. In a speech indorsing the resolution, he said that holders of large tracts of land had discouraged farmers and that Harney county development was retarded by live stock men who held these large tracts. The U. S. reclamation service was prevented from spending money and the Union Pacific did not extend its lines through this part of Central Oregon because of these, he stated.

Many delegates took exception to this statement and heated discussion and argument as to the truth or untruth of it and as to whether stockmen or farmers were the most beneficial to the state finally ended by Chairman Burdick requesting a cessation of argument on the matter. Taking part in the discussion were J. A. Wilcox of Redmond, George Russell of Prineville and others.

A resolution was presented recommending the revision of the irrigation code requiring that water measurements be conducted for a period of three years before final adjudication of the duty of water shall be made in any irrigation project.

The irrigation congress was on its concluding session today. A smoker for the visiting delegates tonight will bring the convention to a close.

# FISH EGGS TO COME BY SLED

## FORESTRY OFFICIALS TO BRING APPROXIMATELY A MILLION TO BEND, TO BE PLACED IMMEDIATELY IN HATCHERY.

Approximately 1,000,000 eastern brook trout eggs will be brought to Bend by sledge to be placed in the hatchery as soon as Forest Supervisor N. G. Jacobson, W. T. Andrews, U. S. logging engineer, and County Clerk J. H. Haner return from a trip to Crane prairie and Elk lake, on which they started this morning. A toboggan, on which the eggs will be carried on their overland trip, trailed behind their auto.

Employees of the fish and game commission have been working for weeks stripping eggs from the trout in Elk lake and the task is now practically completed.

Inspection of timber in the national forest will also be made during the trip.

## DESCHUTES HOLDS HIGH PLACE IN WAR

### Heavy Over-Subscription to Liberty Bonds Shown by Final Report from Headquarters.

An enviable record in the over-subscription of the fourth Liberty loan and in the percentage of the population subscribing is enjoyed by Deschutes county, according to final figures for the state just compiled at Liberty loan headquarters. The county's quota was \$250,481, and the amount raised was \$281,200, making a subscription of 112.26 per cent. The number of individuals subscribing was 3037, making a percentage of 34.91.

Jefferson county subscribed \$71,550, or 174.73 per cent. of its quota, 24.2 per cent. of the population subscribing. In Crook county the quota was \$161,400, and \$175,000 was subscribed, making a percentage of 108.39.

## RED CROSS ORDERED TO STOP KNITTING
