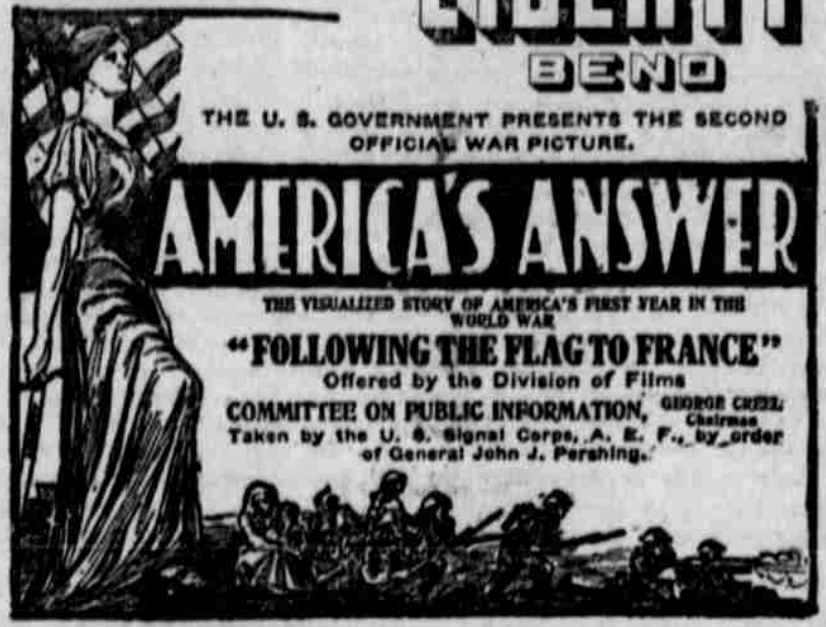

**LOYAL LEGION REPORT GIVEN**

**OUTLINE OF AIMS OF ORGANIZATION MADE BY EMPLOYE MEMBERS WHO ATTENDED RECENT PORTLAND CONVENTION.**

PORTLAND, Jan. 23.—Following the recent meeting of the board of directors of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, the employe members, in order to inform the public regarding the purposes of the organization, have issued the following statement:

"At the meeting of the board of directors of the L. L. L. L., composed of 12 employes, who are chairmen of their districts, and 12 employes from the same districts, both the employe and employer were unanimous in their desire to continue the L. L. L. L. on a 50-50 basis. The L. L. L. L. was organized a little more than a year ago by General Brice P. Disque and every member of the L. L. L. L. pledged himself to be loyal and patriotic and through the efforts of his labor endeavor to meet the requirements of the government for the period of the war. The employe and employer alike have been successful in meeting these requirements and have been highly commended by the army officers and officials of the United States government, and now that the war is over it is the unanimous opinion of the employes, representing more than 100,000 members, that we continue on the same line, working hand in hand with the employers on a co-operative plan and with a fine determination to insure industrial peace; to avert strikes; to keep Bolshevism and I. W. W. ideas out of our ranks and to educate and elevate our members to that spirit of true Americanism and patriotism which is necessary. We have these conditions existing between employer and employe, which are instrumental in encouraging prosperity; namely, the eight-hour day, no reduction of wages below the minimum, and a square deal for all. We are optimistic in our views and as employes feel it is our duty as Americans to further the prosperity of our great nation through our efforts and co-operation."

One of the 12 district chairmen signing the report is Charles N. Hughes of Bend.

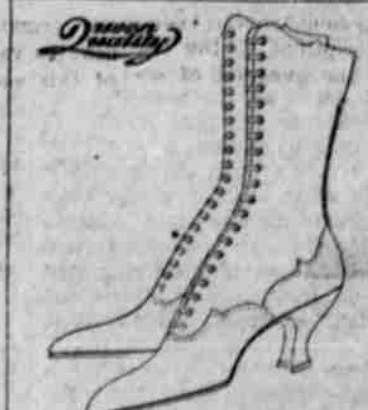

**SHEVLIN-HIXON MILL TO CLOSE SATURDAY**

Temporary Shut-Down to Allow for Repairs to Burner Will Be First Since Operations Began.

The Shevlin-Hixon Company, the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co., and two drawn from professional men in the city.
