## LOST TIME MADE UP AT SISTERS SCHOOL

SISTERS, Feb. 5.—George Davis, Alvin Grady, Allen Harrington and Dorothy Taylor secured the honors at the spelling contest Monday evening.

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## RUSSIA READY TO STOP WAR

LENINE WILL MAKE CONCESSION  
FOR PEACE, BUT IS PREPARED  
FOR HARD FIGHT—SCOPE'S AT  
LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.)  
NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—The Russian soviet government wants peace and will make concessions to get it. If the allies insist on war, however, the soviets will fight to the end. Premier Lenine declared today in a copyrighted article published by the New York World.

Lenine told the World correspondent that the soviets are even inclined to pay the debts of the old regime if by that means war can be stopped.

Asked what he thought of Russia's eligibility to membership in the league of nations, Lenine replied: "They're not forming a league of nations, but a league of imperialists to strangle the nations." He added that President Wilson is a shrewd man.
