LIGHTNING WRECKS TERREBONNE SCHOOL

TERREBONNE, April 15.—Considerable damage was done Sunday by the electric storm which passed over Terrebonne and community. The school house is in need of repairs. The lightning struck the flag pole on the top of the building, branched out to the cornice, got into the air spaces in the concrete blocks and then burst the walls, both inside and out. A whole line of shingles was torn from the east side of the roof, while large rafters were broken and torn down inside. Concrete blocks were torn from the walls of the laboratory, which in turn was wrecked so that it will be useless the balance of this term. The telephone which was in the laboratory was thrown the full length of the hall and broken to pieces. Forty-nine window panes were broken. The inside walls were found to be damaged somewhat, but nothing serious outside of the laboratory. The damage is estimated at from \$800 to \$1000.
