

### LIGHTNING WRECKS TERREBONNE SCHOOL

TERREBONNE, April 15.—Considerable damage was done Sunday by the electric storm which passed over Terrebonne and community. The school house is in need of repairs. The lightning struck the flag pole on the top of the building, branched out to the cornices, got into the air spaces in the concrefe blocks and then burst the walls, both inside and out. A whole line of shingles was torn from the east side of the roof, while large rafters were broken and torn down inside. 
