

I. O. O. F. MEMBERSHIP PASSES TWO MILLION ON ANNIVERSARY

(From Saturday's Daily.)

From an initial membership of five, the number included in the first lodge of Odd Fellows ever organized in America, the fraternity, which is being celebrated all over the United States today, has increased to 2,330,231 men and women, all banded together as members of one mighty organization.

The Independent Order of Odd Fellows had its birth in America in Baltimore, April 26, 1819. Its founders and first advocates in Baltimore were Thomas Wildey, John Welch, John Duncan, John Cheatham and Richard Rushworth. These men had been affiliated previously with Odd Fellowship, being formerly members of the order in England. They met to organize the first American lodge at the tavern of William Lepton, known as the Seven Stars, in Baltimore. The name chosen was Washington lodge of Odd Fellows. Thomas Wildey was the first noble grand.

The following year a charter was obtained from the Duke of York lodge of the Manchester Unity, Preston, England. This charter was not received and formally adopted until October 23, 1820; previous to this time Washington lodge existed as a social benevolent independent body. On February 22, 1821, Washington's birthday, Washington lodge surrendered its English charter to its past grand, who then immediately organized "The Grand Lodge of Maryland and of the United States of America."

It was a long name; long enough not only to satisfy the fancies of the inventors, but to insure its abbreviation at no distant day. Following the organization of the grand body, it rechartered Washington lodge, No. 1. The name of the grand lodge was changed January 12, 1825, to "The Grand Lodge of the United States of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows," and again on September 18, 1829, to the "Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows," by which it has since been known.

Thomas Wildey was the first grand master in 1821 and continued in that office for 12 years. In 1826 this title was changed to that of grand sire. In 1835 he was made traveling agent of the grand lodge of the United States, and in this capacity he traveled north west and south, establishing and encouraging the order wherever he went.

He died in Baltimore, October 10, 1861, at the age of 79 years and was buried in Greenwood cemetery with all the pomp and honors befitting the exalted station and the unequalled services of the originator of the Odd Fellows in America. In Baltimore, a tall monument in a city square records his achievement.

The first official charters to be granted by the grand lodge of Maryland and of the United States, other than to two lodges in Baltimore, were to Massachusetts lodge, No. 1, at Boston and to the Grand lodge of Massachusetts. The first official act of Grand Master Wildey out side of the order in Baltimore, was to proceed to Boston and institute Massachusetts lodge and the grand lodge of Massachusetts. He arrived in Boston on June 6, 1823, and presented the charter to Massachusetts No. 1, June 9, and organized the grand lodge of Massachusetts on June 11.

It is a coincidence, somewhat remarkable that the order was introduced into Maryland and Massachusetts at about the same period of time, 1818 or 1819, by Englishmen who immigrated to the country in 1817. Whether Massachusetts can claim seniority over Maryland is the mooted question but from the best evidence obtainable, historians are of that opinion.

Thomas Wildey left England in 1817 landing at Baltimore on September 2 of that year. James B. Barnes also left England in 1817, and landed in New York, but he immediately proceeded to Boston. Both were prominent Odd Fellows in the old country and both were past grands.

Each landing in the United States without knowledge of the existence of the other went about the task of introducing the order into the adopted country.

Massachusetts lodge, No. 1, dates from March 26, 1820, at which time it adopted a code of by-laws and began to keep records, but it is an established fact that brethren for a long time prior to that date held informal meetings. The lodge was self-instituted and had as much existence after 1819 as it had after March 26, 1820. Washington lodge at Baltimore, was self-instituted, April 26, 1819, the requisite number, five, assembling for the first time on that date. Had the two men, Wildey and Barnes exchanged places, Massachusetts would have been the acknowledged parent of American Odd Fellowship.

WILL PREVENT TIMBER LOSS

RIGID POLICY OF PROSECUTING INDIVIDUALS WILFULLY OR CARELESSLY SETTING FIRES IS TO BE ENFORCED.

Any cases of timber fires believed to have been set, either through carelessness or wilful disregard of the law, will be thoroughly investigated, and prosecution of offenders will be pushed to the limit during the coming season. The declaration of Forest Supervisor N. G. Jacobson, who returned to Bend this morning from Portland, where he attended a meeting of forest supervisors and private timber owners from the northwestern and coast states. As a result of the convention, a most rigid policy of protecting the forests from loss through fire will be in effect, he declares.

Last year, on the Deschutes national forest, fires were chiefly the result of lightning, although there were a number of conflagrations accidentally set. In this latter class, the chief offenders are smokers, who knock out their pipes or throw a lighted cigarette stub on the ground without thinking of the probable consequences. Little trouble has been experienced with campers, who have learned the need of carefully extinguishing their fires before breaking camp.
