Claims.—The matter of claims against the county coming up for consideration, after due examination were continued until the next meeting. The meeting was then adjourned until 1:30 p. m. of this date, at which time the court reconvened, all members being present.

Vacation of Plat of Rosland.—This matter again coming up for consideration it was ordered that the petition for the plat of Rosland be granted.

I. O. O. F. Cemetery, Terrebonne, Oregon.—This matter again coming up for consideration it was ordered that the plat of the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Terrebonne, Oregon be accepted.

George E. Aitken of Sisters appearing with the request that the road east of Sisters be temporarily improved. It was ordered that E. M. Harrington be authorized to put same in proper condition.

George E. Aitken appearing before the court and representing that the Indian Fort road needed improvement, and that it was expedient that Deschutes county co-operate with Jefferson county and the forest service in the improvement of the same, it was ordered that the matter be taken up with the Jefferson county court with the idea of such cooperation.

POISON PREPARED BY COUNTY AGENT

Will Be Given to Deschutes County Farmers at Cost to Use in War Against Sage Rats.

(From Friday's Daily.)

To meet the needs of the farmers who are setting out bait for sage rats, the agricultural agent's office at Redmond has a quantity of poisoned oats prepared for distribution to the farmers at cost of ingredients. The poisoned oats can be had at any time by applying at the office, and arrangements are also made so that the farmers around Bend can get it at the office here on Wednesdays of each week, when the agent will be located in room 32 of the First National Bank building. On these days the agent will bring a quantity of the bait mixed with the strychnine procured through the county rodent funds, and this, of course, has been established for the use of the citizens to reduce the cost of the poison. Considering the effectiveness of the poisoned oats in controlling the sage rat situation, the small cost of applying the bait is negligible. One quart is enough for 50 baits, and this, properly placed, means the death of 50 rats.

You are therefore further notified that the said allegations will be taken as confessed, and your said entry will be cancelled without further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal. If you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the FOURTH publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically responding to these allegations of contest, together with due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person, or by registered mail.

Whitmore, who gives Bend, Oregon, as his postoffice address, did on February 24, 1919, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure cancellation of your homestead entry, No. _____, serial No. 03545, made April 5, 1915, for the S $\frac{1}{2}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$, sec. 2; NE $\frac{1}{4}$, NE $\frac{1}{4}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$, NE $\frac{1}{4}$, SE $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 11, township 22 south, range 18 east, Willamette meridian, and as for grounds for his contest he alleges that I am informed and believe and therefore state that the said William R. Chipp resided on said land only about three months and not longer than four months after he fled on it, and then abandoned the land and never returned; that he never made any improvements or cultivation on said land, except the building of a house which he sold and had had removed from the land, when he left same as above stated, and does not now ever intend to return to the land. That his abandonment of the land was not, and is not due to his employment or service in any capacity in the United States, nor to his service with the United States in any capacity on account of any war in which the United States has been or may now be engaged in.
