

CHURCH PLANS ARE ACCEPTED

CATHEDRAL WILL BE DISTINCTIVE.

Lee A. Thomas Completes Arrangements for New Catholic Church—Edifice Will Be One of Oregon's Finest.

(From Thursday's Daily.) Plans for the new Catholic church to be built in Bend by the local parish have been completed by Lee A. Thomas and accepted by the committee of the Bend church composed of Father Luke A. Sheehan, J. P. Hennessey and W. L. O'Donnell.

Building Unique. In the opinion of the leading architects of the state the new church is to be one of the distinctive buildings of Oregon. In type it will be a combination of the French and English gothic architecture, with its high pinnacles and elaborate stone trimmings.

In designing the features of the front elevation Mr. Thomas has devoted more than two months of study by way of comparison with some of the country's most magnificent cathedrals.

The structure will be 48 feet wide and 108 feet in depth. From the floor to the ridge the height will be 55 feet. The building will be of local pressed brick with grey stone trimmings, all of which will harmonize with the trimmings which have been selected.

The new edifice will have a seating capacity of approximately 500 persons. The plans as to the interior finishing and arrangement have not been fully decided upon, but they provide that the interior will harmonize in every particular with the exterior, which will be completed entire.

As to the approximate date of beginning construction, Mr. Thomas was unable to state. It will depend largely upon the labor and material conditions. Mr. Thomas hopes that construction may begin early in the summer.

The church will sit upon the present site of the Catholic parish house on Franklin street, east of Bond street. The grounds will be graded and harmonized with the style of structure. Mr. Thomas will soon have an illustration of the front elevation for publication.

POSTOFFICE IN NEW LOCATION

WALL STREET LEASE IS TAKEN.

O'Donnell Brothers' Offer Accepted—Will Erect New Building Costing About \$20,000—Postoffice to Be on Ground Floor.

(From Thursday's Daily.) The Bend postoffice will occupy new quarters on Wall street as soon as a building can be erected for the purpose. This fact became known this morning when Acting Postmaster W. H. Hudson received word that the offer of W. L. and T. M. O'Donnell to provide a room for the postoffice had been accepted.

Under the terms of the lease the building is to be ready for occupancy on or before August 15. A space 26.6 feet wide by 100 long it to be assured, but the depth will probably be 124 feet.

In anticipation of the removal of the postoffice to the new site, which is just adjoining the location of the office prior to its removal to the Sphier building, plans for a building have been prepared by Architect Lee Thomas. It is now Mr. O'Donnell's intention to proceed with the construction as rapidly as possible.

The building will be of brick and with the lot will represent an expenditure of approximately \$20,000. The postoffice will occupy the entire ground floor. The second floor will be divided into six apartments of three rooms each, and each having a bath and modern plumbing.

Failure of the owners to provide necessary fixtures, as called for in the lease of the present postoffice, caused the department to cancel the contract and seek a new location.

MUSIC INSTITUTE TO OPEN IN BEND

Bend is to have a long felt want fulfilled—a modern and thoroughly equipped institute of music, where the highest class instruction can be obtained. The same opportunities will be offered students here as are given in the largest cities.

The West Coast Institute of Music, with headquarters on the fifth floor of the Eilers Music building, 287 Washington St., Portland, Ore., and branches in other cities, will further extend its institutes by opening up a thoroughly equipped branch in Bend for adult students and children.

The people of Bend are to be congratulated on having an institution of such merit come to this city, as it will fill a long felt want, and its success will depend upon the encouragement it receives from the people of Bend.

Departments will be installed for voice culture, piano, violin, theory, harmony and technique, where personal instruction will be given. A special method for beginners will be introduced for the first time in Bend, which has been endorsed by some of the foremost leading musicians in the country, and which has proven a complete success.

There will be departments for those who wish to take up teaching as a profession, as well as for advanced students and beginners. During the courses, recitals, "at homes" will be given for the purpose of preparing pupils for concert and platform work.

The main institute at Portland has an enrollment of over three hundred pupils, which makes it the largest of any musical institute on the western coast. The strongest proof of the real value of any course of instruction is the personal opinion of those who have given it a thorough test.

To organize and get started in Bend without loss of time, a special scholarship rate will be offered to a limited number of pupils who enroll. The regular \$75 scholarship, consisting of seven months' tuition, will be given for \$40 payable on a time basis covering a period of half a year.

BUILD HOMES ON JOHNSON RANCH

(From Saturday's Daily.) There is an "own your own home" campaign going on in a small way out on the former Johnson ranch, now on the market by J. B. Miner.

New owners of acreages there are beginning to put up residences for occupancy. Some of these structures are only temporary, but the land owners expect to do bigger things soon.

Of the total of 1280 acres approximately 700 acres have been sold, according to J. B. Miner. The new residents are harrowing their ground and will soon set in trees.

To Lea McFeron and Orpha McFeron, defendants, above named: In the name of the state of Oregon you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled case and cause, on or before the 15th day of May, 1919, which is more than six weeks after the 3rd day of April, 1919, the date of the first publication of this summons and if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in the complaint, to-wit: For a decree of this court dissolving the bonds of matrimony heretofore and now existing between plaintiff and defendant, and for such other and further relief as to the court may appear just and equitable.

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
