COUNTY BOND ELECTION SET

\$125,000 FLOTATION TO AID IN BUILDING OF THE DALLAS-CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY AND MARKET ROADS UP JUNE 3.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

Responding to a petition bearing 139 names, the Deschutes county court today authorized a county election on June 3, at which time a \$125,000 road bond issue will be voted on. Of the total amount which it is expected to raise by this means, \$60,000 will be used to co-operate with the state in the construction of The Dallas-California highway, the remainder to go for the improvement of various so-called market roads.

The bonds, it is stipulated, shall draw not more than 5 1/2 per cent. interest, and will be serial in character after the fourth year, final retirement of the county's securities to be made at the end of 10 years.
