CLEAN VACUUM TANK WEEKLY

Unless Foreign Matter is Removed at Frequent Intervals Carburetor Troubles Ensur.

Once a week or so it is advisable to open the drain cock at the bottom of the vacuum feed tank. It will generally be found that a few drops of rust and water will flow out before any gasoline appears. Sometimes it is necessary to push a wire up the drain cock to start a flow of any sort. The inference is that unless this foreign matter is removed at regular intervals carburetion trouble may ensue.

PLAN FOR ADJUSTING GEARS

Small Pocket Mirror Mounted on Iron Wire Handle Will Be Found Very Convenient.

In adjusting differential gears difficulty is often experienced in seeing whether the gears are meshing properly. A small pocket mirror, mounted on a soft iron wire handle, may be used in much the same manner as a dentist's mirror. Inspection or repair on many hidden and obscure parts is also facilitated by the use of this mirror.

TOURISTS BEGIN THEIR TRAVELS

BEND IS ATTRACTING AUTOISTS

Outsiders are Well Informed Regarding Central Oregon Roads Lakes and Streams--Camp Grounds Are Popular.

If the last week is any indication of the activity of the tourist travel through Central Oregon, there will be a continuous stream of automobilists through this section this coming summer. It is conservatively estimated that no less than 50 auto loads of people have passed through Bend in the last six days enroute to points in this part of the state. In questioning the tourists it has been found that they are planning to make many side trips, enroute through the state, having heard of Central Oregon's choice streams, lakes, and mountain camping spots.
"You will be surprised how the tourist studies the road," said one garage man this week. "I venture the statement that Portland and out of the state tourists know more of the roads through the state, know more about our lakes streams and mountains than we local people do. I questioned one party which went through early this week and I was surprised to find how well informed this party of tourists was on the conditions in this part of the country."
"The itinerary was all mapped out and accurately too."

The Camp Bend is daily becoming more popular. There is scarcely a night passes but from one to five small fires may be seen in the camp ground enclosure. It has been aptly suggested by a person interested in making the camp grounds a feature of the city, that small brick Dutch ovens might be constructed in the enclosure which would be of accommodation to the tourists in preparing their meals. This feature has been successfully undertaken in other cities where camping grounds for tourists are featured.
