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

CLEAN VACUUM TANK WEEKLY

Unless Foreign Matter Is Removed at Frequent Intervals Carburetor Troubles Ensue.

Once a week or so it is advisable to open the drain cock at the bottom of the vacuum feed tank. It will generally be found that a few drops of rust and water will flow out before any gasoline appears. Sometimes it is necessary to push a wire up the drain cock to start a flow of any sort. The inference is that unless this foreign matter is removed at regular intervals carburction trouble may ensue.
