**O. A. C. TO COOPERATE
IN PIG CLUB WORK**

H. C. Seymour, state club leader of the Oregon Agricultural college, in company with R. A. Ward of the First National bank, visited the Simpson ranch last evening and inspected the pigs which are to be distributed to the boys and girls of the bank pig club on Wednesday. At a meeting held last evening by Mr. Seymour, County Agent Koons, Superintendent Thompson and Mr. Ward, the extension service and school superintendent's office went on record as favoring the close cooperation of state and federal forces with banks and other cooperations providing the children were regularly enrolled as State Industrial club members. Arrangements have been made for the pig club members to become also State Industrial club members, which will result in the children being able to compete at the State fair and the Pacific International stock show in the industrial division for the various prizes offered. This will be in addition to the prizes and awards especially offered by the First National bank at the fall pig show.

By this arrangement club workers from the O. A. C. will visit the children during the year and give special instruction in club work. The regular department of agriculture pig club lessons and instruction sheets will be supplied to the children from time to time, and the children's reports will be checked by the agricultural college as well as the bank. At the bankers' convention, and also in the conference yesterday, the extension forces commended the activities of the banks of the country in financing and promoting this work.

**ARTILLERYMEN
TO PLAY BEND**

FAMOUS BATTERY A CLUB OF
147TH FIELD ARTILLERY IS
MATCHED AGAINST LOCAL
NINE FOR THREE-DAY SERIES.

As one of the big attractions which will be offered to those who are in Bend for the celebration of Independence day will be a ball game between the famous Battery A, 147th field artillery, team and the Bend nine, it was announced today. In addition to the Fourth of July contest, the artillerymen will also play here on the fifth and sixth.

Battery A returned from overseas service with its ball team practically intact, and during 17 months in France had a record of defeating 37 fast service clubs. Many of the players have been decorated for valor, and the entire battery is bringing home more decorations than any other field artillery organization in the service, it is said.

The artillery team will probably be the best aggregation which the local team will be pitted against during the present season, and in preparation for the three-day series Manager Ash Houston of the Bend team is putting his players through a rigorous course of sprouts and will have them in the pink of condition by the Fourth, he declares. Weak spots will be strengthened, and every effort will be made to provide a top-notch nine to oppose the soldiers.
