### MEAT ANIMALS ON THE FARM.

Last November the secretary of agriculture addressed a statement to the farmers of the nation in which he said: "The world will have need particularly of a greater supply than normal of livestock, especially of fats. We should not fail therefore to adopt every feasible means of economically increasing our livestock products." How the farmers are responding to this council is shown in the recent report of the bureau of crop estimates, which is based upon reports from about 10,000 reporters. The farm supply of swine says the report increased about 18.5 per cent, or about 11,892,000 head, during March as compared with the increase of about 7.6, or 4,759,000 during March of last year. The supply of cattle increased about 2.8 per cent during March of this year and a year ago, but form the standpoint of numbers the increase in March of this year was 1,959,000 head, as compared for 1,846,000 head for the month a year ago. The sheep appears to have increased 11.9 per cent., or 6,394,000 head in March, as compared with an increase of 7.5 per cent., or 3,696,000 head in March of last year. From January 1 to April 1 the apparent increase of sheep was 20.5 per cent., or 10,294,000 head, as compared with an increase of 9 per cent or 4,337,000 head in the first three months of 1918.

It is not necessary to build extensive poultry houses but they should be servicable, fairly roomy, well lighted and well ventilated and without drafts.

The general purpose breeds of poultry are best for the back yard flock. They will supply both eggs and meat. They are usually good sitters and good mothers.
