EXPECTS ADVANCE IN WOOL PRICES

Eastern representatives of the Columbia Basin Wool Warehouse company of Portland, expect that wool prices reached this season will be among the best in years, was the report this morning of E. P. Mahaffey, of the Central Oregon bank, on his return from a business trip to Portland. Wool experts informed him that there would be practically no danger from the Australian clip, and stated that virtually all of the vast quantities of wool contracted for by the American government had already been used, eliminating the possibility of the government-owned surplus flooding the market.
Mr. Mahaffey was advised that much higher prices than those now quoted would in all probability be offered later in the season.
