HEPPNER MEN BUY THEATER

WILLIAM H. PARKINSON AND O. M. WHITTINGTON TO TAKE OVER THE GRAND JULY 15—CONTROL LIBERTY TODAY.

(From Monday's Daily.) That he and his partner, William H. Parkinson, will take over the ownership of the Grand theater on July 15 was the announcement today of O. M. Whittington, recently of Heppner. The deal is completed, he said, but L. C. Rudow, who opened the movie theater in its present location in December, 1916, was unable to release the management of the establishment until the middle of the month because of film contracts extending to that date. The consideration involved in the purchase of the

Grand theater is not given. Announcement of the acquisition of the theater business on Bond street follows close on the deal made last week by Mr. Parkinson and Mr. Whittington with Ward Coble for securing the Liberty. They assumed management of the Wall street show-house today.

SMALL GIRL STARTS WALL STREET FIRE

Nine-Year-Old Child Tells Mother She Will Lay "Fire for Dinner," Then Calls for Help.

Fire, accidentally set this morning in the single story frame building, part of the Cora Jones holdings on Wall near Oregon street, resulted in practically a total loss of the fixtures of the Central Oregon cleaning shop, where the blaze started. The structure was not sufficiently damaged to warrant rebuilding. "I am going to make a fire to get dinner," nine-year-old Rita,

daughter of Mrs. Otto Gross, called to her mother shortly before 8 o'clock, and a moment later called out that the place was all on fire.
