

MANY RUMORS FOLLOW WORK OF ENGINEERS

C. & E. CONSTRUCTION HOPED FOR.

WOULD OPEN FORESTS

Presence of Workmen, However, May Merely Mean Beginning of Suttles Lake Project, Recently Announced.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

Fishermen and tourists who have visited the western section of Jefferson county in the vicinity of Suttles lake and the Santiam pass recently report the presence there of parties of engineers or workmen whose activity has given rise to various rumors of development work in that section.

One report has it that workmen are busy near the Santiam pass. What they are doing is not stated, but their presence has caused a revival of talk of the possibility of the construction of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, a line surveyed several years ago from Detroit, on the west side of the Cascades, across the Santiam and over to Tumalo. At that time Bend was not looked upon as holding promise of development, and the survey turned east from Tumalo. If built today the line would undoubtedly come into Bend.

Road Already Surveyed.

With the present eastern terminus of the line now only some 80 miles from Bend, and the survey running for a great part of its course through desirable timber, it is pointed out that construction of the road would make it possible to market this timber at the present time when an unusual demand prevails. On the other hand, no reason for putting a surveying party in the field in connection with this road is seen since the line has been completely surveyed in the past, and if the road were to be built it would be necessary simply to start building.

As projected, the Corvallis & Eastern runs through the timber northwest of Sisters owned by Louis W. Hill. Mr. Hill visited Bend about two years ago and made a trip into his timber holdings. At that time it was predicted that he would soon be milling and it is possible, though admittedly improbable, that the reported activity is in connection with Mr. Hill's timber development.

Power Development Suggested.

Another Hill angle to the matter is suggested by those who remember that for several years the Hill interests had a party on Square lake doing preliminary work on an electrical development scheme. Just what may be going on in this connection at the present time is not known, but some profess to see in the present activity further development of this project.

Still another possibility, and the one which seems to have the greater weight of probability, is that the party in the field is doing preliminary work on the Suttles lake irrigation project. Harry J. Chenoweth of Grandview, the active head of the project, has recently reported that a contract for the construction has been let. That it has seems highly probable in view of recent legislation guaranteeing interest on irrigation district bonds and thereby making a construction contract quite worth while from a contractor's viewpoint.

Rumor Widely Spread.

Or, as a local gossip who was discussing the matter yesterday said, "It may be something else yet again." Until some definite announcement is made the reports are providing grounds for all sorts of speculative comment, and in some quarters real excitement like that of the good old days when there was no big saw mill and no railroad and every man with a surveying instrument was the advance guard of a railroad construction crew and the stranger who bought supplies for a four-day fishing trip was the representative of a lumber company that would build a new saw mill at once.

CARRIER PIGEONS ARE PROVING VALUE

Birds Make Trip from East Lake to Bend in 40 Minutes—One Carries Report of Timber Fire.

(From Monday's Daily.) Pigeons brought to Bend last winter by William Sprout of the forest

service, are demonstrating their value as a means of communication between points not connected by telephones. Mr. Sprout declared today, following a trip to East lake, where he carried on a series of tests with the birds. Six pigeons were taken to the lake and released at intervals, time being kept on the flight by carefully synchronized watches in Bend and at the lake. The birds took from 40 to 60 minutes each in making the trip. One small fire was located by Mr. Sprout and the news sent in by carrier pigeon before it could be transmitted by phone by the fire lookout.
