

BEND IS PROMISING DAIRY CENTER SAYS O. A. C. EXPERT

Alfalfa and Associated Crops Needed for Successful Operations—Silos Become Numerous in Eastern Oregon.

CORVALLIS, July 30.—Is Bend a promising dairy country? This was the first question shot at Prof. E. B. FITTS, dairy specialist for the state agricultural college extension service...

"Is it?" Prof. Fitts repeated quickly. "Well any district that can grow alfalfa and associated crops as the Bend region grows, usually has about everything needed for successful dairy production."

"That sounded promising and since no other element of the dairy business—breeding, manufacturing and marketing—was up for consideration, the following points, among others, were reported as applicable to dairying in the Bend district."

Silos Become Numerous.

From 1000 to 1200 silos will be built in Oregon this season, Eastern and Central Oregon having the lion's share, about 800. But even at that the upper state territories will lack a good deal with catching up with western Oregon in the number of silos in operation...

Dairy feed is only one of several factors that influence and determine profits and losses in business, but it is one that depends to a great extent on soil and climate and market facilities.

Home Feeds Necessary. And more and cheaper and better home-grown feeds are one of the great needs of the dairy business in Oregon, says Prof. P. M. Brandt, head of the college dairy department.

are compared with corn silage analyses from the corn belt states, the first of each group, no college figures for Oregon corn silage being available:

Moisture 73.7, 77.2; ash 1.7, 2.52; protein 2.1, 2.42; fat .8, .55; crude fibre 6.35, 6.62; nitrogen free extracts 15.4, 11.68.

Milk Not Endangered.

Danger of taint in the milk and butter from the use of sunflower silage, seems no greater than the danger of taint from other kinds of silage. Director Center, of the extension service, says that any kind of silage can be fed in a manner to produce taint or to avoid it.

Of course, the fact that the sunflower contains nutriment comparable to corn nutrients does not necessarily mean that dairy stock or other animals can extract the same or greater degree of food substance.

In the mean time other crops for silage—roots, kale, pasturage, used in connection with alfalfa and other roughage in many dairy districts, will be depended upon by Bend dairymen to help solve the cheaper food problem in successful dairying.
