## What Busy Farmers Are Doing

Experiments with sunflowers are proving successful in various parts of the county, according to information received this week at the First National Bank. From Fort Rock George Menkenmaier reports sunflowers not bothered with rodents now stand two and one-half feet. Mr. Menkenmaier, reports that the crop has not been irrigated and that he will sow a greater number next year. The frost did not do a great deal of damage.

H. O. Piercy of Tumalo, reports that the sun flowers he planted this spring now stand more than four feet high and the stalks are as thick as the average heavy walking stick. Mr. Piercy states next year, when sowing sun flowers he will irrigate the ground before hand.

Steps will be taken at once for the big banker-farmer mixer to be held in this county early in September. It is planned to hold the mixer on Labor day. The committee appointed to attend to the
