## BEND WOMAN OWNS NEWSPAPER OF 1800

Copy of Ulster Gazette, Giving Account of Death of Washington in Possession of Mrs. Minter.

Of great interest from an historical standpoint is a copy of the Ulster Gazette, of the date of January 4, 1800, owned by Mrs. R. P. Minter of this city, in which the account of the death of George Washington, the month before, is published. The paper is a four page, four column edition and is yellow with age, but is still easily legible, the type faces differing but little from those in use at the present day.

Even at that early date the newspaper's value as an advertising was recognized, and one announcement was even made of the sale of a slave.

## CLOUDY SKIES RARE DURING PAST MONTH

Eighteen Days Recorded as Clear—July 9, with 99 Degrees, Hottest Day of the Season.

Eighteen clear days, 11 partly cloudy, and two in which the prevailing character of the day was cloudy, were recorded during the month just past at the cooperative meteorological station in Bend. Rain fell on three days, and the total precipitation was .35 of an inch, although a much larger rainfall in some of the other districts of Central Oregon was measured.

The hottest day of the month came on July 9, with 99 degrees, and the coldest night was on July 7, with 31 degrees. The greatest range of temperature, 58 degrees was on July 9.

The heaviest precipitation for the month was on July 23, when .23 of an inch was recorded.
