NO OPEN SEASON ON ELK, SAYS WARDEN

Permanent Protection Provided by Law Enacted by Legislature in 1913 Is Explained.

"There is to be no shooting of

elk in Oregon during the year 1919." Such is the declaration of State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker, who has received a number of inquiries as to the date of the opening of the season for hunting elk. In order that the misunderstanding might be corrected the game warden explained that the 1909 law protected elk until Au-

gust 1, 1919, but this law was repealed by the 1913 legislature and perpetual protection was provided. "There will be no open season on elk in this state at any time unless the legislature fixes one at some future time. We only have a few elk in the state and an open season would kill practically all of these off," said Mr. Shoemaker.

WORK TO BEGIN ON RIVER FISH LADDERS

To begin work on the construction of the fish ladders on the Deschutes, for which an appropriation of \$5000 was made by the last legislature, R. E. Clanton, master fish warden, accompanied by Captain Thomas A. Sweeney, arrived here Friday. The work will be in Captain Sweeney's charge and will take about three weeks to finish.

According to Mr. Clanton, the beginning will probably be made at Steelhead falls and from there the crew will move to Big falls or to Clime falls as conditions direct. Water conditions are especially favorable at the present time for the work.

Captain Sweeney was with the 43rd engineers in France and has been back only about three weeks.
