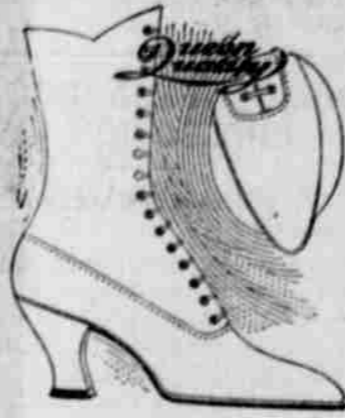

BUSINESS MEN TO HELP BURNS

Ready to aid the Burns Chamber of Commerce in bridging the 27-mile gap which at present exists between the ends of rural mail routes now extending from the two cities, the Bend Commercial club took action on resolutions submitted by the Burns chamber, and authorized the appointment of a committee to cooperate in securing a Bend to Burns mail route. Members of the committee are D. H. Peoples, A. Whisnant, and Ross Farnham. The committee authorized at the last meeting to take up the matter of changes in the Sinnott bill for the exchange of logged off private lands for government stumpage, was announced as composed of D. G. McPherson, R. S. Hamilton, and R. W. Sawyer.

H. J. Overturf, chairman of the committee appointed to cooperate with the Central Labor Council in preparing for the coming state labor convention, was called on for a report, and stated that the manner in which this cooperation would be given, would be decided at a meeting Wednesday.
