

# FAIR DETAILS ARE COMPLETE

## GRANGE - SOUTH SIDE TO EXHIBIT.

Rules and Regulations Announced for First Fair to Be Held on October 8—County Court Helps Farmers.

With the arranging of a premium list and posting of rules for exhibitors, practically everything is complete for the fair to be held on Wednesday, October 8, by the members of the Grange and South Side district Fair association. Premiums are unusually liberal, an appropriation by the Deschutes county court supplying the funds for this purpose. Exhibitors, it is provided, may enter the grange hall for the purpose of arranging their displays as early as 10 o'clock on the morning of the fair, but may not remove any articles of farm produce entered in competition until after 5 o'clock of the same day. What is looked forward to as one of the enjoyable features of the fair will be the box luncheon which will be served at noon.

Rules just made public, stipulate that each article entered for competition must be the property of the person in whose name it is entered, and must be in addition, have been

grown or made by that individual. Premiums awarded at other fairs may not be used in decorating exhibits at the Grange-South Side Fair.

Cards will be furnished for all articles exhibited, giving class and entry number, and these tickets must remain attached to the article until after awards are made. The judges may report only articles for premiums in the regular list, but can make especial recommendations where articles not listed are considered worthy of premiums. Affixing of blue ribbons, designating first place, and red ribbons signifying second place, shall follow immediately after the judging.

Although the association will take every possible precaution for the safe keeping of articles brought in for exhibition, no responsibility for loss or damage to these will be assumed. Exhibitors are asked to give especial attention to their property at the close of the fair.

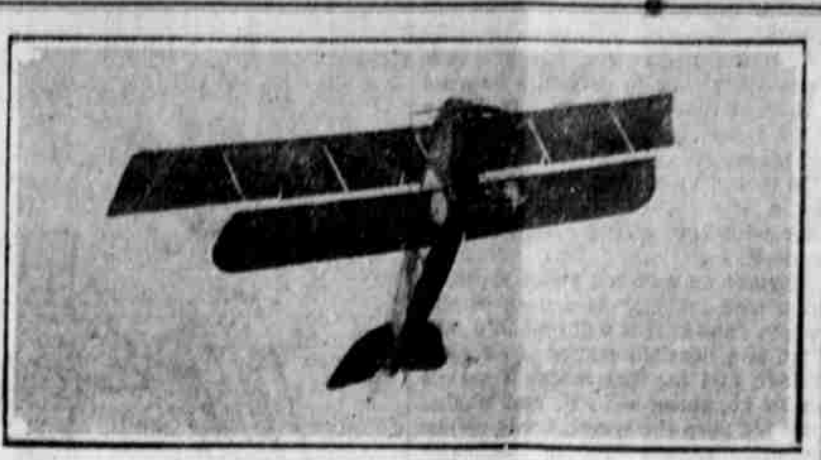
Every measure possible will be enforced to insure absolute impartiality in judging entries, and in line with this ruling it is ordered that no person shall be allowed to see the entry book, nor shall any information be given out concerning entries, until after the judging has been finished. General farm exhibits, it is emphasized, remain the property of the exhibitor.

Because of the generous provision made for the fair by the county court, it will not be necessary to charge an entrance fee. The only request made of those attending is that well-filled lunch baskets be brought.

## SAILOR WINS COVETED PALM

AWARD FOR GALLANTRY IN ACTION MADE TO BEND RECRUITING OFFICER FOR WORK IN DOWNING GERMAN PLANE.

For conspicuous gallantry in action, Derrick Warner, U. S. Navy recruiting officer Monday received from the navy department, a croix de guerre and palm. The awards come in recognition of his work as a machine gunner in a bombing plane when fighting over Chateau Thierry on July 17 and 18 of last year. The palm was given for valor on the second day, when a German plane was brought down. He was flying with the French at the time. During the war, the Bend recruiting officer was 15 months overseas, being with the northern bombing group, flights in which he took part were made from Paris, Dunkirk, Calais, East Lee, England, and Maralta, Belgium. He has been in the navy for 19 years and five months.

## SHOW INTEREST IN RABBIT WAR

PRINEVILLE AND CROOK COUNTY LEARN ADVANTAGES OF POISONING OVER THE BOUNTY PAYMENT METHOD.

That Prineville and Crook county are intensely interested in the jack-rabbit war due to start in Deschutes, Jefferson, and Lake counties in Nov., was the report made Monday by R. A. Ward after a trip to the Crook county seat in the course of his work appraising the lands of the Ochoo project. Mr. Ward attended a meeting of the Prineville Chamber of Commerce, where it was stated that the jackrabbit pest is especially bad in the Roberts and Paulina sections. Crops have been virtually cleaned out by the rodents.  
Mr. Ward outlined to the Prineville club the plans of the U. S. biological survey to attack the jackrabbits with poison, and promised to put the government experts in touch with the Crook county situation. He also emphasized the advantages of using poison over the bounty method, and mentioned how Harney county, form-
