**DEBATE PLAN FOR 1919-1920 FIXED FOR STATE SCHOOLS**

**ELIMINATION DECIDES CHAMPIONS.**

District Leaders Will Engage in Big Tournament at University of Oregon—New Rules Are Drawn Up.

A new plan has been announced for the carrying on of debates in the State of Oregon. Each of 12 debating districts will select champion team by elimination. Then these teams will all be sent to the University of Oregon, at Eugene for a final grand debate. There each of the representatives of the districts, from the eastern side of the mountains will debate against each of the other eastern representatives. Then the team having the highest number of votes from its various judges will be selected as the champion of the East. The same plan will be used in the West and after all have selected their winning team the two champion teams will meet to debate for the championship of the state. There are many advantages in this new method of debate over the old one heretofore used.

The first advantage is that the new plan will lengthen the period for district contests, thus permitting more thorough preparation.

The second advantage is that it will permit district directors, where

they may find it expedient to do so, to work out a percentage rather than a straight elimination schedule for the district contests. In this way a team will have still other chances of debating even if it is defeated in the first round.

A third advantage is that it will decrease very materially, the unbearable expense hitherto imposed on the district winners in the bringing of opponents great distances to meet them in one contest after another. The expenses of judges will also be eliminated.

Fourth—Small schools will be encouraged, since there will be twelve prizes instead of one.

Fifth—The sometimes, unfortunate disagreements between opposing schools over the place, judges, expenses, etc., will be absent.

Finally, this plan will result in the direct focussing of sustained and accumulated interest in the first grand tournament. Interest will be intensified as the series progresses and the suspense grows. This concentrated interest from all over the state will help debating leagues of Oregon a great deal.
