A special class was created by the judges when the appearance of Mrs. Anna Curry and her interesting collection of pickaninnies made it necessary to draw the color line, and a special prize was awarded to the ebony hued family.

Decorations in keeping with the season were excellently done, and especial attention was attracted by a number of life-sized witches, suspended from the rafters. This part of the preparation was in charge of Miss Elsie Horn, while the Halloween luncheon served on the stage was under the management of Mrs. J. M. Lawrence. Mrs. Jack Arnold headed the floor committee, and Mrs.

R. S. Dart was in charge of the general arrangements.

Before the evening was over, it was announced that the Elks lodge had made a donation of \$75 to the Library club, and with this, it was estimated that the library would benefit to the extent of \$300 from the evening's entertainment.

Collections Better Here Than Anywhere in Three States, Says Albert Helander.

That the Bend agency is considered the best in the entire territory of the Pacific Building & Loan association, was the declaration of Albert Helander, general manager of the association, after spending Wednesday in Bend making a survey of local conditions. The agencies of the building and loan association are scattered over Oregon, Washington, and Idaho.

More than 100 loans have been made through the local agency, re-

presented by J. A. Eastes, and Mr. Helander states that there is less difficulty over monthly collections than in any other city in which the association operates.

Find Date Valuable Food.
Dates form the staple food of the Arabs in a large part of Arabia and are served in some form at every meal. Sirup and vinegar are made from old dates, and by those who disregard the teachings of the Koran a kind of brandy is distilled from them. The date pit is ground and fed to the cows and sheep, so that nothing of the precious fruit may be lost. Whole pits are used as beads and counters for the Arab children in their games on the desert sand.
