EXPERTS WILL AID IN STOCK SELECTION

Frank Brown of Carrolton, Oregon has volunteered to lend his full cooperation to the farmers of this section of the state in the purchase of purebred Shorthorn cattle at the Livestock Exposition in Portland next week. Mr. Brown is field representative of the American Shorthorn Breeders association and is an authority in Shorthorn cattle.

TO OPEN PAVILION.

The opening of the new pavilion of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition at Portland occurs on November 17. This show is now in its ninth year and will celebrate with proper ceremonies the occupation of the new half million dollar home.
