BIG RANCH BOUGHT AT POWELL BUTTE

POWELL BUTTE, Nov. 18.—One of the biggest land transfers and the most significant to this country for many months was the sale last week the Allan Wilcoxin irrigated ranch, near Powell Butte store, consisting of 120 acres of alfalfa. A new home and good ranch buildings for \$18,000 to Mr. and Mrs. Scheurer, well known auto stage people of Redmond. Mr. Scheurer also purchased a forty from Frank McCaffrey, thus squaring his ranch. He also purchased an "eighty" from Herman Meyers. That lies something like 2 miles from Community Hall. This land is in cultivation also. The price of it was \$100 per acre. They have bought about 835 head of sheep taking all that Mr. Wilcoxin had and some from Mr. McCormack.
